Summary statement:

The Council as Local Planning Authority has a duty under the Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas) Act1990 to periodically review the Districts Conservation Area boundaries, to identify other areas that may be suitable for designation and to prepare preservation and enhancement proposals where appropriate.

Conservation Area Assessments have been produced for Baildon Green: Eldwick Beck and a full consultation process has taken place in each area. The findings are presented with this report.

The designation or re-designation of a Conservation Area is a function that has been delegated from the Executive to the appropriate Area Committees following the consultation and agreement of the appropriate Area Planning Panel

This report therefore asks members of the Shipley Area Planning Panel to agree the Conservation Area Assessments; the proposed Conservation Area boundaries; the outcomes from the public consultation, and recommend that the Shipley Area Committee formally adopts the assessments and the proposed Conservation Area boundaries for the above mentioned Conservation Areas.

1.0 SUMMARY

- 1.1 The Council as Local Planning Authority has a duty under the Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas) Act1990 to periodically review the Districts Conservation Area boundaries, to identify other areas that may be suitable for designation and to prepare preservation and enhancement proposals where appropriate.
- 1.2 Conservation Area Assessments have been produced for Baildon Green and Eldwick Beck; full consultation process has taken place in each area. Summary findings are presented with this report. See Appendix 3-4
- 1.3 The designation or re-designation of a Conservation Area is a function that has been delegated by the Executive to the appropriate Area Committees following the consultation with the appropriate Area Planning Panel.
- 1.4 This report therefore asks members of the Shipley Area Planning Panel to consider the Conservation Area Assessments, proposed boundaries and the outcomes from the public consultation and recommend that the Shipley Area Committee formally adopts the assessments and Conservation Area boundaries for the above mentioned Conservation Areas.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Councils Conservation Area Assessment Programme started in November 2001. To date the Council has undertaken 57 assessments and is in the process of completing the 5 yearly appraisals. To date 47 Conservation Area appraisals have been undertaken and it is anticipated that the final 10 appraisals will be undertaken by March 2010. The appraisals are a means of keeping the Conservation Area Assessments up to date in line with Local Best Value Indicator 219b
- 2.2 The proposed Conservation Areas are Baildon Green and Eldwick Beck. Full Conservation Area Assessments have been written for each area.
- 2.3 The objectives of a Conservation Area Assessment is to:
 - Define and record the special interest of the Conservation Area
 - Re-assess the current boundary
 - Assess any action that may be necessary to safeguard the special interest
 - To raise public awareness and gain support

3.0 OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1 The consultation process for each area involved the following stages
 - Draft Conservation Area Assessment placed on deposit and made available on the Councils Web site
 - Comprehensive draft summary of the document with map distributed to each property in the conservation area and its surroundings

- Invitation to attend a workshop held in the local area
- Comment sheets distributed with the summary to encourage feedback from people not wanting to attend the workshop
- Further consultations when necessary following workshop

- 8.2 That the Strategic Director, Regeneration be instructed to prepare and submit for such consideration as is appropriate, Draft Supplementary Planning Guidance as identified by the local communities and as resources permit.
- 8.3 That the Draft Supplementary Planning Guidance and any representations made following consultation be reported to a future meeting of the Area Planning Panel (Shipley).





Need to protect the whole concourse of the Beck which runs along Saltaire Road.

Include Rylstone House and the Beck up to Hammondale House

Need to protect the whole of the course of the beck down to the bridge.

Field opposite Springs to ensure future developments are in keeping with conservation area principle (already in Greenbelt designated area)

Proposed changes: extending to end of Saltaire Road and exclude Meadow Sweet Farm.
