1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report provides information from engagement work carried out with communities and partners within Bradford South in the period 1st January 2014 to 31st December 2014.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Bradford South Area Committee Action Plan 2014–17 was developed on a Ward basis being underpinned by Ward Leadership Teams, Ward Officer Teams and engagement with communities and partners.
- 2.2 The Bradford South Area Co-ordinator's Office undertakes engagement work with communities and partners through a wide range of activities as follows:
 - a) Ward Forums 1 Ward Forum per ward held per year across Bradford South to identify priorities to feed into the Ward Plans
 - b) Single Issues Forums held as and when the need arises to allow us to respond to specific issues in specific areas
 - c) Working with Older Peoples Groups / Coffee mornings / Luncheon Clubs information giving to residents about services available, residents reporting issues to officers and also developing projects such as Dementia Friendly, Cold Calling Control Zones etc
 - d) Undertaking Days of Actions / site meetings which focus on education, information giving, sign posting communities to services and engaging with residents to find out key local issues
 - e) Working with businesses on issues such as crime and community safety issues, parking issues etc
 - f) Working with children and young people in schools on educational awareness projects such as Junior Wardens, litter picking and recycling projects
 - g) Working with formalised Community Groups, Community Partnerships, Friends of Parks and Cemeteries Groups on projects, activities, consultations, fun days
 - h) Ward Officer Teams / Ward Leadership Teams meetings held on six-weekly basis for each Ward with partners – discussing key issues and taking joint action to resolve these issues
 - i) Bradford South Health Hub representatives from community groups, organisations and practitioners that meet to network and highlight health issues across the area
