#### 1. SUMMARY

The application is for the grant of a Premises Licence for the sale of alcohol.

#### 2. BACKGROUND

#### 2.1 The applicants

Haworth Cricket Club. A copy of the application is included at Appendix 1.

#### 2.2 The Premises

Haworth Cricket Club, West Lane, Haworth.

#### 2.3 Application

The application is for the grant of a Premises Licence. The operating schedule describes the following as the relevant licensable activities applied for:-

• Sale of alcohol for consumption on or off the premises

Hours of licensable activities:

Monday to Friday: 18.00 to 23.00 Saturday & Sunday: 12.00 to 23.00 Bank Holiday Mondays: 12.00 to 23.00

### 2.4 Steps proposed by the applicant to address the Licensing Objectives

a) Prevention of crime and disorder will be achieved by;

We operate a zero tolerance to drug use or dealing, foul & abusive language or violent acts at our cricket club and would immediately bar any person involved in such activities from our facilities.

Notices to this effect will be displayed.

Our facility is very small  $(9m \times 7m)$  so we can very easily monitor the behaviour of our customers. As the opening times of the bar will mainly be when matches are taking place, we will always have 12 or more senior club members present to deal with any incidents.

b) Public safety will be achieved by;

Ours is a very small building, however there are two doors and three large windows, all of which would provide escape routes in the event of an emergency.

As a cricket club we already carry a first aid kit should the need arise.

There will be emergency lighting installed in the event of a power failure and also a fire extinguisher.

c) Prevention of public nuisance will be achieved by;

Our ground is situated approx 50m behind housing on West Lane, Haworth. These houses have long gardens so our facility is well away from the residences.

We are surrounded by open farmland to the other three sides.

We do not envisage litter problems, to leave our clubhouse you have to walk 100m to the gate at the other side of the ground and we have waste bins inside our ground.

We do not plan on having music playing so there will be no noise pollution.

Notices will be displayed asking customers to leave our ground quietly.

d) Protection of children from harm will be achieved by;

As a responsible cricket club we have already adopted and adhere to the ECB 'safe hands and welfare of young people policy'.

All our club members who are involved in junior cricket, together with our club captains have had CRB checks.

There will be no activities taking place at our facility that will in any way expose children to adult entertainment, children will only be allowed if accompanied by an adult

We will operate a proof of age scheme based on 'Challenge 21' and request proof of age where it is felt necessary.

#### e) General – all four licensing objectives

We are a small family orientated cricket club who pride ourselves on creating a friendly sociable environment for our members, their families and our small number of spectators.

Our main aim is to allow players and spectators alike to enjoy a sociable drink at our ground and the main use of our bar will be after the games where the players from both teams can gather to enjoy a drink and discuss the days play.

Just as we will not tolerate any bad behaviour on the cricket field, we will apply the same principles to running the bar, and at the first sign of any trouble will immediately close it. We aim to have two personal licence holders who will have attended and passed the national certificate for personal licence holders.

#### 2.5 Relevant Representations Received

#### **Interested Parties**

Local Residents – Five letters of representation have been received from local residents and a business in the vicinity. The representations raise concerns of noise nuisance and disturbance from people attending the Club and children being exposed to sales of alcohol. The residents also have concerns about litter problems, such as bottles and cans being left on garden walls.

The representations are attached at Appendix 2.

### **Legal Appraisal**

- 4.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires the Council to carry out its various licensing functions so as to promote the following four licensing objectives:
  - a) the prevention of crime and disorder
  - b) public safety
  - c) the prevention of public nuisance
  - d) the protection of children from harm
- 4.2 The Council must also have regard to the guidance issued by the Department of Culture Media and Sport under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regard must also be taken of the Council's statement of Licensing Policy for the District.
- 4.3 Where it is decided it is necessary to depart from the statutory guidance or the Licensing Policy on the merits of a particular case; then special reasons justifying this must be given that can be sustained.
- 4.4 Only "relevant representations" by or expressly on behalf of a defined "interested party" or "responsible authority" can be taken into account. In order to be "relevant" a representation must fairly relate to achieving a licensing objective. If it does not, it must be discounted.
- 4.5 Any licensing conditions that Members may propose attaching must also relate to achieving one of the licensing objectives; be tailored to the actual premises and style of licensable activity; must be reasonably achievable by the applicant and in his/her control.

#### **Statement of Policy Issues**

4.6 The following parts of the Licensing Policy are of particular importance; Part 6 (prevention of Public Nuisance) & Part 7 (protection of Children from Harm).

4.7 The Annexes to the Policy sets out various types of model condition that could be considered.

#### 5. OPTIONS

- 5.1 Members may:
  - (a) Grant a premises licence as applied for subject to any mandatory conditions and the precautions specified in the operating schedule submitted.
  - (b) Grant a premises licence subject to such additional conditions relating to achievement of the licensing objectives as members think fit; or
  - (c) Refuse the application for a premises licence.
- 5.2 Should the applicant or any other party to the hearing feel aggrieved at any decision with regard to the licence or to any conditions or restrictions attached by Members they may appeal to the Magistrates Court.

Article 6 – A procedural right to a fair hearing. As refusal of the application is an option, adherence to the Panels' usual procedure of affording a hearing to the applicant is very important. The applicant should also be able to examine the requirements of the fire authority. If the decision is to refuse then reasons should be given.

#### b) The prevention of crime and disorder

WE OPERATE A ZERO TOLLERANCE TO DRUG USE OR DEALING, FOUL & ABUSIVE LANGUAGE OR VIOLENT ACTS AT OUR CRICKET CLUB AND WOULD IMMEDIATELY BAR ANY PERSON INVOLVED IN SUCH ACTIVITIES FROM OUR FACILITIES.

NOTICES TO THIS EFFECT WILL BE DISPLAYED.

OUR FACILITY IS VERY SMALL (9M X 7M) SO WE CAN VERY EASILY MONITOR THE BEHAVIOUR OF OUR CUSTOMERS. AS THE OPENING TIMES OF THE BAR WILL MAINLY BE WHEN MATCHES ARE TAING PLACE, WE WILL ALWAYS HAVE 12 OR MORE SENIOR CLUB MEMBERS PRESENT TO DEAL WITH ANY INCIDENTS.

#### c) Public safety

OURS IS A VERY SMALL BUILDING, HOWEVER THERE ARE TWO DOORS AND THREE LARGE WINDOWS, ALL OF WHICH WOULD PROVIDE ESCAPE ROUTES IN THE EVENT OF AN EMERGENCY.

AS A CRICKET CLUB WE ALREADY CARRY A FIRST AID KIT SHOULD THE NEED ARISE,

THERE WILL BE EMERGENCY LIGHTING INSTALLED IN THE EVENT OF A POWER FAILURE AND ALSO A FIRE EXTINGUISHER.

#### d) The prevention of public nuisance

OUR GROUND IS SITUATED APPROX 50M BEHIND HOUSING ON WEST LANE HAWORTH. THESE HOUSES HAVE LONG GARDENS SO OUR FACILITY IS WELL AWAY FROM THE RESIDENCES. WE ARE SURROUNDED BY OPEN FARMLAND TO THE OTHER THREE SIDES.

WE DO NOT ENVISAGE LITTER PROBLEMS, TO LEAVE OUR CLUBHOUSE YOU HAVE TO WALK 100M TO THE GATE AT THE OTHER SIDE OF THE GROUND AND WE HAVE WASTE BINS INSIDE OUR GROUND.

WE DO NOT PLAN ON HAVING MUSIC PLAYING SO THERE WILL BE NO NOISE POLLUTION.

NOTICES WILL BE DISPLAYED ASKING CUSTOMERS TO LEAVE OUR GROUND QUIETLY.

THERE WILL BE NO ACTIVITIES TAKING PLACE AT OUR FACILITY THAT WILL IN ANY WAY EXPOSE CHILDREN TO ADULT ENTERTAINMENT. CHILDREN WILL ONLY BE ALLOWED IF ACCOMPANIED BY AN ADULT.

### RE: Haworth Cricket Club - application for license dated 5.3.11

I am writing regarding the above application for a drinks license. I would like to object to the granting of the license for the following reasons.

My partner and I moved into our home just over two years ago. It is situated directly behind the cricket club and its quiet surroundings were one of the main reasons we were attracted to the house. Overall, we have found the area peaceful, but the layout of the nearby houses and valley mean noise seems to be amplified and can echo. We already experience a considerable amount of disturbance from revellers returning from the Old Sun Hotel pub at the weekends — which has an exceptionally late license — and are very concerned at the possibility of more disruption, every single night of the week, literally on our doorstep. This is not in keeping with the area we thought we had moved to.

While people attending cricket matches contribute some disturbance, currently, this issue is limited to daytimes and the cricket season. The hours applied for are, we feel, unacceptable. As a young couple we are hoping to start a family very soon. There is very little separating the back of our house and garden with the cricket club (we in fact have a gate leading directly onto the field, set in the middle of a low fence) and the thought of strangers under the influence of alcohol and/or smoking being so close to our home, and potentially young children, is incredibly worrying. The licensing hours applied for would allow people to drink for most of the day at the weekends, as well as a number of hours each week day. This is not the safe environment in which we want to bring our children up in.

In addition, there have been a number of occasions where certain visitors to the cricket club have failed to treat the area with the respect and care it deserves. They have left rubbish, including empty alcohol bottles and cans, on the wall and ground at the end of our garden, as well as accidently causing damage to our aged fence. While this is manageable at present, we can only expect these problems to worsen.

With the amount of tourists passing by and frequently stopping to photograph the front of our house coupled with the visitors to the cricket club behind, we feel our privacy is already compromised. Adding further incentive for yet more people to traipse past or congregate at the end of our garden would be unnecessarily intrusive and unfair. There are tight controls on what we, as residents, are allowed to do with our properties and gardens to keep with the style of the village – something we have been happy to support. If this license were to be granted it would leave us very exposed and feeling that we have very limited options for maintaining any form of privacy.

Haworth is a beautifully picturesque tourist destination – an area that we feel privileged to live in. Originally, we moved away from the city to try and escape the crime and noise pollution we were experiencing. We were attracted to the village's history, quiet surroundings and stunning views. Granting a license allowing hours of daily alcohol consumption, in the heart of the most peaceful part of the village would shatter everything Haworth means to us, and I suspect, what it means to countless others, be them residents or tourists.

We know others have serious concerns about the license and hope you will seriously consider both their and our objections.

I write regarding the above application for a drinks license. I would like to object to the granting of such a license for the following reasons.

The Cricket Club is situated right next to a quiet residential area. To my knowledge there has never been a license at the club. In fact I believe it used to belong to Haworth Methodist Church on West Lane and I would have thought when they gave the club to the trustees there would have been a covenant that no drinking was allowed. The granting of a license could mean a lot of people drinking all day, all weekend and up until 23.00 at night. Leaving the club even later than that. Customers congregating outside the clubhouse drinking and smoking. The club at the moment attracts people who want to watch the match. If the club was licensed it could attract people just for the drinking. I know this to be the case with other licensed cricket clubs but these are not right next to residents. If alcohol was on the premises it could also cause a security nuisance as it is in such a quiet area.

The approach to the Club follows right next to houses. There is currently no lighting outside the club. To be able to use it at night in the dark lighting would need to be placed all along the approach to the club behind these houses, causing a great deal of light pollution. There is no Car Park – parking is on the nearest road – there is limited parking used by residents and tourists and this parking is already nearly always used up. Extra cars would cause I believe a lot of noise and fume pollution. Customers/revellers not in cars would be walking along the back of the houses and then along the front. I understand that late night revellers from the Sun Pub only 100 yards away is subject at the moment to a petition by residents. There could also be a lot of noise generated from the clubhouse itself as it appears quite flimsy. Presumably, smoking would also take place outside creating further noise. There are young children in the houses backing directly onto the club and they would be unable to sleep with the noise and light pollution.

The Cricket Club has traditionally been used for the season matches. It has never as far as I know been used for functions which I understand would be the plan for it if this license was granted. I also feel that an application for a music license would soon follow. There is currently only two toilets to my knowledge and I am not aware that there is any mains drainage.

There are currently many pubs in Haworth – one less than 100 yards away from the club. I would imagine they are all struggling for business at the moment and the granting of a further license would surely just take even more business away from them, particularly if the drinks were offered at discount prices. As Haworth is a tourist attraction it would not look good if the pubs on Main Street were closed and boarded up. I also think the other cricket club in Haworth is already licensed although there are no residents anywhere near it.

The Cricket Club, I believe, recently obtained funding for an extension. I understand that one of the big reasons for granting this was based on the fact that is is and would be used for children. There are currently two junior teams at the club. I believe a lot of parents choose that club because it is not licensed as drinking around children is not necessarily a good example to set young children who presumably are trying to get fit. I feel there is enough binge drinking – do we have to have drinking alongside children's sport as well.

The cricket club has run successfully for years without a drinks license, I believe it has fitted well into the surrounding residential area and given residents and others a peaceful haven from the stresses of life. You quite regularly see someone sitting around there for a quiet moment of reflection. It is a lovely club and I understand why some people might like to license it but I believe it is in entirely the wrong setting for such a license to be granted.



### Objections to proposed alcohol license at Haworth Cricket Club, West Lane, Haworth

I am writing to register our strongest objections to the proposed alcohol license for Haworth Cricket Club, West Lane, Haworth on both a personal and professional level.

I own and manage a West Lane of which the Tourist Board accredited rating is 4star gold. This is reflected in both the price and the types of guests we attract. Our current pricing for a double occupancy room is from 90.00 up to £140.00. Typically we are chosen as a preferred place to stay in Haworth as our guests are assured of peace and quiet in a tranquil setting which is not something normally associated with the Main Street for example. We even use this as a unique selling point on our website and have favourable feedback from guests on review sites acknowledging this. As a business in a residential area, we are always conscious of ensuring our business does not adversely affect the neighbouring community. For example we do not allow one night stays on weekends as we do not wish to attract guests that are coming to visit for the sole purpose of place to stay after spending the day drinking and using our place as an alternative to a taxi home. We have and will always ensure that our business is respectful of our neighbours and of course the home that we live in.

I also want to highlight the fact that we actually live at West Lane on the lower ground floor and our bedroom overlooks the cricket club, as do 75% of our windows. The only thing between us and the cricket ground is our neighbours garden and our own patio. There are no trees or natural sound barriers to break up noise. Furthermore, as it's in an area which is greenbelt farmland and in a valley, any sound amplifies. To put this into perceptive when cricket is being played we hear in our house the bat hitting the ball, through double glazing. Being in area of natural beauty, people will naturally be outside during the warmer months so the noise and lack of privacy will be unbearable. If the cricket club was successful in their application, the noise level would disturb not only our paying guests... but also us.

There are other reasons why the application should be rejected. For example:

- At the moment when there is a cricket match on, all the free parking along West Lane is taken up and this is
  nightmare for us as invariably people use our driveway to turn around in. We can only envisage this would get
  worse if they obtain a drinking licence with taxi's etc stopping and beeping their horns and with vehicles being
  left overnight with 'designated 'drivers picking up their vehicles in the morning.
- Furthermore the noise pollution ... of which there will be... again will disturb residents. The last thing we need in Haworth is even more public nuisance by creating another drinking establishment in a quiet residential area where people will be exiting on mass at closing time. Furthermore it will attract the type of clientele who are not members for the sport but for the bar only. This licence would serve only to profit the cricket club. There are no other benefits to either the local residents or the local environment just disruption and noise.


• There are so many licence places in Haworth, at least twelve that I can think of (a number of these also provide accommodation and function rooms) why do we need more? There is, in fact, a pub (with plenty of parking) opposite the entrance to the cricket field less than a minute away, with many more being less than a 5 min walk away. If there is another licensed place to drink, West Lane will become a focal point for drinkers on a pub crawl.

So in summary our objection is based on the following points

- The premises is not suitable for the sale of alcohol because of its residential, greenbelt location
- It is likely to attract clientele for the purpose of drinking only and not for sport
- It will impact on our business dramatically by incurring public nuisances during licence hours and most definitely upon existing the club
- Haworth is already overrun with pubs and licensed accommodation
- It will impact on our business as we cannot mislead guests that we are situated in a quiet peaceful area as it no longer will be

Thank you for your time and consideration of the above concerns and hope as do many of my neighbours we have spoken to, that you will not allow the licence through. I enclose also for your information visual information to illustrate the above points.

Re: Haworth Cricket Club Licence Application

My interest in this application is due to the close proximity of the new extension in which the bar is situated to my property. The extenson is 2 yards from the boundary wall separating the club from my garden and approximately 30 yards from the rear of my property.

As you will appreciate given the nature of the club much of the alcohol sold will be consumed outdoors, and, on summer evenings given the proposed closing time is likely to continue long after games have been completed. My concern is that given the long period of opening noise levels are likely to be significant, and a serious nuisance. Potentially this could be the case two or three nights a week over a period of several months of the year.

I am also concerned that the planning application for the extension refers to possible vehicular access to the club. Cars and taxis coming and going from the club late at night would also be disturbing to residents on West Lane.

I also note from the planning application a significant emphasis on the benefits to youngsters of the new extension. It is the case that from May to July there are a significant number of youth team games that are well supported. Given the serious problems with alcohol consumption amngst young people is it sensible to have a bar available when these games take place.

In conclusion, would the support given for the construction from local primary schools and churches have been given had a bar been referred to in the planning application?
