1. Summary

1.1 The applicant

1.4 **Application**

The application is for the grant of a Premises Licence. The operating schedule describes the following as the relevant licensable activities applied for:-

- Sale/supply of alcohol
- · Provision of regulated entertainment
- Provision of late night refreshment

Hours of licensable activities:

<u>Sale of alcohol, provision of regulated entertainment & provision of late night refreshment (from 23.00)</u>

Sunday to Wednesday: 10.00 to 00.00 Thursday to Saturday: 10.00 to 01.00

Christmas Eve: A further additional hour

Non Standard Timings: A further additional hour into the morning following on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday of every statutory Bank Holiday weekend, including the Thursday prior to Easter Bank Holiday.

Non Standard Timings: A further additional hour to those stated above on St

Patrick's Day, St George's Day, St Andrew's Day & St David's Day

Hours the premises proposed to be open:

Sunday to Wednesday: 10.00 to 01.00 Thursday to Saturday: 10.00 to 02.00

Christmas Eve: A further additional hour

Non Standard Timings: A further additional hour into the morning following on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday of every statutory Bank Holiday weekend, including the Thursday prior to Easter Bank Holiday.

Non Standard Timings: A further additional hour to those stated above on St

Patrick's Day, St George's Day, St Andrew's Day & St David's Day

1.5 Steps proposed by the applicant to address the Licensing Objectives

a) Prevention of crime and disorder will be achieved by;

The DPS shall at all times maintain a zero tolerance policy with regard to illegal drugs (including appropriate staff training in detection and prevention); and shall co-operate with the West Yorkshire Police's Drugs Watch initiative or similar scheme.

The DPS shall ensure that disc jockeys or other similar announcers employed at the premises shall at appropriate intervals request customers when leaving the premises to do so in a quiet and orderly manner.

The DPS shall ensure that all instances of crime and disorder are recorded in an incident log book that is made available to West Yorkshire Police on request. West Yorkshire Police will also receive regular reports of such incidents from the DPS.

b) Public Safety will be achieved by;

The DPS shall ensure that all management and staff are properly trained in the stated health and safety policy of the premises.

Free drinking water will be available at all times on request from patrons.

c) Prevention of public nuisance will be achieved by;

The DPS will instruct all staff (including temporary staff) to conduct regular internal and external patrols of the premises in order to monitor and eliminate any noise nuisance during regulated entertainment.

d) Protection of children from harm will be achieved by;

The DPS shall enforce a recognised and effective proof of age policy in the premises in order to ensure unaccompanied underage children are not allowed access when alcohol sales are taking place in the premises.

e) General – all four licensing objectives

The Licensee/DPS will seek to retain an harmonious working and social environment with the Local Authority and Responsible Bodies, and the local neighbourhood, and will be prepared to support where reasonable local incentives/schemes to promote the licensing objectives.

2. Relevant Representations Received

2.1 Interested Parties

<u>Local Residents</u> – 4 letters of representation have been received, on the grounds of anticipated noise nuisance from regulated entertainment and anticipated noise,

disturbance and anti-social behaviour by patrons leaving the premises late at night. The residents also state that the premises are in a residential area.

The letters are attached at Appendix 2.

3. Legal Appraisal

- 3.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires the Council to carry out its various licensing functions so as to promote the following four licensing objectives:
 - a) the prevention of crime and disorder
 - b) public safety
 - c) the prevention of public nuisance
 - d) the protection of children from harm
- 3.2 The Council must also have regard to the guidance issued by the Department of Culture Media and Sport under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regard must also be taken of the Council's statement of Licensing Policy for the District.
- 3.3 Where it is decided it is necessary to depart from the statutory guidance or the Licensing Policy on the merits of a particular case; then special reasons justifying this must be given that can be sustained.
- 3.4 Only "relevant representations" by or expressly on behalf of a defined "interested party" or "responsible authority" can be taken into account. In order to be "relevant" a representation must fairly relate to achieving a licensing objective. If it does not, it must be discounted.
- 3.5 Any licensing conditions that Members may propose attaching must also relate to achieving one of the licensing objectives; be tailored to the actual premises and style of licensable activity; must be reasonably achievable by the applicant and in his/her control.

4. Statement of Policy Issues

- 4.1 The following part of the Licensing Policy is of particular importance; Part 4 (prevention of crime & disorder) and Part 6 (prevention of Public Nuisance).
- 4.2 The Annexes to the Policy sets out various types of model condition that could be considered.

5. Legal Options

- 5.1 Members may:
 - (a) Grant a premises licence as applied for subject to any mandatory conditions and the precautions specified in the operating schedule submitted.
 - (b) Grant a premises licence subject to such additional conditions relating to achievement of the licensing objectives as members think fit; or

- (c) Refuse the application for a premises licence. (this will effectively mean that the premises could not open unless by authority of a temporary event notice without breaching the licensing laws).
- 5.2 Should the applicant or any other party to the hearing feel aggrieved at any decision with regard to the licence or to any conditions or restrictions attached by Members they may appeal to the Magistrates Court.

6. Financial and resource appraisal

6.1 There are no apparent finance or resource implications.

7.1 Equal Rights

There are no apparent equal rights implications.

7.3 Community safety implications

There are no apparent community safety implications.

7.4 Human Rights Act

The following rights are applicable:

The Council's powers set out in the recommendations fall within the states right. A fair balance must be struck between public safety and the applicant's rights.

Article 6 – A procedural right to a fair hearing. As refusal of the application is an option, adherence to the Panels' usual procedure of affording a hearing to the applicant is very important. The applicant should also be able to examine the requirements of the fire authority. If the decision is to refuse then reasons should be given.

We write to express our strong objection to the application made by Punch Taverns plc for extended licensing hours at the Greyhound Public House in Tong Village.

The Greyhound is in the middle of this small village and very close to many homes, ours included. We already suffer from considerable noise at closing time as the car park is only a matter of 50 or 60 yards from our bedroom window. There have been numerous occasions recently when we have been kept awake by people continuing loud conversations and slamming car doors in the car park after leaving the pub — many times long after the official "drinking-up" time has passed. Surely we should be allowed to have our sleep undisturbed.

The all-day opening laws have also increased the number of people who use the adjoining cricket field as an outdoor drinking area and the extra noise and nuisance due to balls being hit or kicked over our wall is becoming intolerable. Our garden has ceased to be our own. These later opening hours would only add to our problems.

We do not think that the character of what is designated a Conservation Area should be allowed to be spoiled by the extra traffic and noise pollution which would undoubtedly result from the long and frequent extended hours which are proposed in the application. The character of the Greyhound Public House would also be changed irreparably.

Please take these points into serious consideration when this application is being decided as the lives of many people – young and old – will be badly affected by these proposed changes.

We are writing to oppose the application, made by Punch Taverns plc in respect of the Greyhound Public House, 23 Tong Lane, Tong Village, BD4 0RR for the extension to the licensing hours.

This public house is situated in the centre of a small, residential village which is also designated a conservation area with a number of listed buildings including the Greyhound Public House.

To quote from the Dictionary conservation means "careful preservation and protection, especially of a natural resource, the quality of the environment, or plant or animal, to prevent exploitation or destruction, etc"

We feel that any extension to the current licensing hours is unacceptable and we oppose this for the following reasons.

1. Excessive Noise

Late night / early morning music accompanied by the loud vocal utterances from individuals who are under the influence of excessive alcohol which might vary from mild inebriation to profound drunkenness is unacceptable. The local residents already tolerate the collection of glass bottles before 6am with its associated loud clatter, the delivery of beer and other alcoholic beverages before 7am and the frequent loud chatter, slamming of car doors and careless use of car alarms after midnight together with drunkards wandering around the surrounding lanes in the early hours of the morning.

It is extremely worrying that an application can be made for such long and such frequent extended licensing hours. There are homes situated just 10meters away from the actual pub building with bedrooms overlooking the car park. It is grossly unfair to allow potential disturbance to the sleep of the individuals who live in the immediate vicinity of the public house.

Children attending school and professional people require undisturbed sleep and surely it is a basic human right that individuals be allowed undisturbed sleep. Surely the right to sleep should take precedence over the delivery of entertainment for profit by this public house outside traditional licensing hours. The residents of Tong Village pay some of the highest council tax contributions in the city of Bradford. These residents demand uninterrupted sleep and we feel that the public

house should be quiet and have completed its business and be empty between the hours of midnight and 7am.

2. Health Issues

Any extension to drinking hours is well known to encourage excessive alcohol consumption with its associated health problems. There are many children living within this small community and to extend the licensing hours gives out all the wrong signals to these vulnerable, impressionable people by the licensing trade and authourities.

3. The change in the character of the Greyhound Public House

Tong Village is a small village within a conservation area and it has always had the Greyhound Pub at its heart as a traditional inn adjoining the cricket pitch. These proposed alterations to the licensing hours, facilities and functions will completely alter the character of this traditional village public house which has served as an asset to the village for so many years.

Please do not risk any changes, which will be to the detriment of the pub itself, the character of the village and its local inhabitants.

We hope that you consider carefully these comments and that you will reject this application made by Punch Taverns.

We request that you acknowledge receipt of this letter, that you inform us of the outcome of this application and that you inform us of any further applications for changes to the current licensing arrangements made on behalf of the Greyhound Public House.

I wish to oppose this application in the strongest terms.

The pub is situated yards from a number of residences, some the homes of very young children. Up to now we have tolerated the noise of voices and traffic generated by the volume of visitors to a popular public house in the knowledge that there would be quiet by midnight. I feel it utterly unreasonable that we should be required to tolerate the noise of car doors slamming, traffic revving up to leave the car park and the often strident voices of those who have spent some time in the Greyhound until 1.00 or 2.00 a.m.

The character of the Greyhound is that of a traditional village pub where cricket matches are an integral part of summer weekends and families are welcomed to enjoy watching the match sitting out on the perimeter of the cricket field. There is also a pleasant restaurant where diners can enjoy an evening meal.

I oppose the introduction of live music running late into the evening with the sound carrying out into the village.

The extension of drinking hours offers the opportunity for patrons to over- indulge with detrimental effects on health at a time when the Government is raising awareness of the health problems associated with alcohol.

I note that the Greyhound has reduced the number of car parking spaces because of the extension to the dining area. I oppose any development which will result in more cars being parked on the narrow main road through the village after dark as this will cause an additional hazard to both pedestrians and drivers.

Application by Punch Taverns plc for extended hours at The Greyhound Public House, Tong Village, Bradford BD4 0RR

I note the advertised application by Punch Taverns plc for extensions of licensing hours at the above public house.

The advertisement has been placed in the window of the pub behind leaded lights which obscure some of the critical times and days, and I wonder whether this amounts to proper notice being given?

It appears that the owners are applying for substantial extensions of hours for the consumption of alcohol and for live and recorded music.

As the owner of the above property which is in direct line of sight and sound of "The Greyhound", I wish to make my objection to all the proposals known.

"The Greyhound" has recently undertaken substantial building works purportedly to extend the kitchen and restaurant areas. These extensions seemed beneficial to the ambience of the "friendly country village pub", and I did not object to them. However in the light of this application for extension of opening hours it is clear that the building extensions are part of a plan by the owners to materially alter the nature of the pub and the impact of the public house on its neighbours within the village community.

The plans to open until 1.00 am Thursday to Saturday and 2.00 am during Bank Holidays and certain religious feast days constitutes a material and unacceptable commercial encroachment into the life of a quiet, rural village which would have a direct and adverse effect on the neighbouring properties with little if any converse benefit for the village community, as the extended hours would be aimed at attracting a clientele from outside the area.

The grounds of objection are:

1. Noise

The topography of Tong Village is such that sound echoes around the area and is amplified. The pub lies at the heart of this natural sounding board, and so relatively small noises sound much louder than they would in an urban environment. My property lies immediately opposite the pub with the cricket field between us. We can already witness the effect of excessive noise on the occasions that the pub (and also the Tong Village Hotel further up the village) holds events, such as at Christmas and Bonfire Night. We are prepared to tolerate occasional festive excess, but not on a regular basis. Live and amplified recorded music would be particularly disturbing, as the pub has little if any sound insulation. However even an extension of drinking hours would have a serious noise effect, as our experience is that loud revelling, car doors banging and (quite regularly) car alarms sounding produce substantial distraction. If these noises occur during normal hours of sleep, our quality of life, and that of our neighbours will be seriously and adversely affected.

2. Disturbance

We have recently had two examples of men urinating in or immediately outside neighbours' gardens. I do not believe that extended hours produce better behaviour from drinkers. We can reasonably anticipate that extended hours would lead to further examples of men and youths wandering around the adjoining properties in the early hours of the morning giving us security concerns and further night time disturbance. Increased legitimate foot and traffic activity within the village in the early hours would also provide a mask for illegitimate activity. Of particular concerns is the number of thefts of stone roofing tiles and paths from the village, most of which occurs under the cover of darkness on stormy nights when the sound is masked. Pub noise into the early hours three nights a week would increase the risks of such thefts, and of other break ins.

3. Traffic and parking

Tong Village is not on a public transport route, and so it follows that all additional trade generated by the proposed extended hours would generate additional motor traffic into the village. There is no public car parking space within the village. The only car parks are the ones in the grounds of "The Greyhound" and of the "holiday Inn" hotel.

The effect of the pub's recent building extensions has been to reduce the number of parking spaces within its car park available to customers, and it is noticeable, particularly on Friday evenings, Saturdays and Sunday afternoons, that substantial numbers of cars are now parking fully on the pavement between the pub and Nettleton Close, and on the road in front of the cricket field. This means

that pedestrians including anyone pushing a child buggy, are forced to walk in the road to get round the cars. If this were to happen on a regular basis in times of darkness this would create a potentially fatal hazard for the residents of Tong.

Tong is already subject to traffic calming restrictions as it is used as a rat run by increasing volumes of traffic, and it would run entirely counter to those measures to allow an extension of commercial development in the centre of the village which would bring even more cars onto the already inadequate village street and increase the numbers of cars parked on the narrow lane.

4. Conservation

Tong is a conservation area in the midst of an area of beautiful green fields and woodlands. The leisure activities appropriate to such an area should be aimed at daytime visitors. The provision of late night live music and drinking into the early hours of the morning would have just as radical effect on the nature of the conservation area as would any inappropriate building operations.

I should make it clear that I object to all aspects of the application. It may be that Punch Taverns has put in a deliberately excessive application with the intention of negotiating modifications by way of concession. It may also be that the application has been submitted with a view to increasing the value of the pub with a view to potential sale, and without any immediate plans for regular late night opening. In either case my objection to the application is fundamental and would extend to any concessionary modifications.

I would be grateful if you would take these points of objection into account when considering this application.
