The application is for the grant of a Premises Licence for the sale of alcohol and provision of regulated entertainment and late night refreshment.

a representation must fairly relate to achieving a licensing objective. If it does not, it must be discounted.

4.5 Any licensing conditions that Members may propose attaching must also relate to achieving one of the licensing objectives; be tailored to the actual premises and style of licensable activity; must be reasonably achievable by the applicant and in his/her control.

Part 3 – Operating Schedule Please give a general description of the premises...

North Parade is one of the most attractive streets in Bradford city centre, made up of many beautiful (and Grade II listed) buildings. Number 32 is one such building although it is the case that this application relates only to the ground floor and basement of the premises. A photograph is attached showing a simple street level view of the front of number 32.

Planning Permission has been granted to allow for the redevelopment of these empty premises as a European style cafe bar. Given the building's retail history Change of Use from A1 to A4 had, of course, to be sought. Permission was granted on 30.11.10.

32 North Parade is, effectively, part of a terrace. To one side, there is an empty former retail unit. To the other side there is Computer Repairs shop/Internet cafe.

The ground floor and basement of number 32 are entirely self contained and the Lease is to be obtained regarding these parts of the building only. The upper floors of the building are occupied by way of offices belonging to Read Dunn Connell Solicitors. These offices certainly do not seem to be occupied during the evening or at the weekend.

Internally at number 32 the ground floor is open and accessed by 1 door direct from the street. The actual bar (ie. the counter) will be on the ground floor. Seating will be by way wooden chairs and tables, none of which are likely to be in a fixed position.

The basement is an entirely usable space. Here, are the toilets and the beer cellar. There will be further furniture which, again, will not be fixed.

From the basement there is access to a small enclosed yard. This will not be used by customers.

It is anticipated that outside the premises there will be a bench or 2 small tables with a few chairs. Such will not block the pavement in any way and will only reflect similar pavement usage at 2 business nearby, Montagu's sandwiches and Feroni's cafe.

General Information

The business to be established will trade as The Sparrow. As stated previously the business type will be that of a European style cafe bar or, to use Belgian or Dutch terminology, a Bier Cafe. The dynamic of The Sparrow will be far removed from that of the traditional pub. Indeed, this development is one which is entirely new to Bradford city centre.

A substantial amount of high quality bottled beer (perhaps 50 plus different styles predominantly from Belgium, Germany and America) will be available along with bottles from England and further afield. Additionally, 3 hand pulled ales will be offered along with 2 or 3 European beers/lagers.

Further, there will be a good choice of quality cider, red, rose and white wine and the sale of Free Trade tea and coffee will feature throughout the day and into the evening.

Predominantly, though, The Sparrow will trade as a Cafe Bar/Bier Cafe. However, it is important to stress again that The Sparrow will be far removed from that traditional image often associated with a city centre bar or pub.

An interesting and quality food menu will be available but full hot meals will not be served. The food offered will include "deli style" sandwiches, platters of meats and cheeses, quality pies with pickles etc. A sweet menu will also be available featuring craft cup cakes, quality pastries and the like.

The policy of The Sparrow as regards hand pulled ales and food will be to source locally where possible and, in any event, to utilise local companies in all areas permissible.

Artwork and music will also be an important aspect of The Sparrow although it should be stressed that whilst "low key" entertainment may feature the environment will never be that of a club.

Links with local artists (both independent and at Bradford School of Art) are in the process of being established and it is envisaged that artist's work will be exhibited throughout the bar both by way of decoration and on a retail basis.

The Sparrow will fit somewhere between the cosy, dimly lit European bar and the hip, arty establishment to be found in Leeds, Manchester and London. In fact, The Sparrow will be a bar of such quality that it will be comparable to or, frankly, better than the best bars of any city.

Featuring a stylish bespoke designed interior and art by local and national artists and illustrators, The Sparrow will pride itself on championing the visual arts. Music will also features heavily in The Sparrow with ever evolving playlists hand selected with much care and attention. Customers can expect occasional guest DJ sets, special events and the odd gig here and there.

The Sparrow will appeal therefore to all manner of person including the beer connoisseur and the CAMRA member through to students, stylish independents, professionals and to those just wanting somewhere new in our City. Indeed, The Sparrow wants to appeal to a wide age range and customer base. Further, fellow traders and shoppers in Bradford really do need new places to socialise in the City and to this end The Sparrow will fit the bill.

By day The Sparrow will be a relaxed place to grab a quiet bite to eat and drink. By night, it will be a place to hang out with a quality beverage against a backdrop of great music and design.

It is anticipated that both Les Hall and Mark Husak will have Personal Licences which should lead to at least one Personal Licence holder being on the premises at all times. When The Sparrow commences trading it may be the case that only Les Hall will have the Licence on the basis that Mark Husak will be obtaining his shortly thereafter.

Initially, staff levels at The Sparrow will be modest. However, the 2 part time members of staff presently identified both have substantial experience in the licensed trade which will be refreshed if necessary. Further members of staff will receive the appropriate level of training.

Les Hall and Mark Husak are at present subject to a 1 year mentoring programme where the mentor in question is Mr David Haigh of Haigy's Public House, Lumb Lane, Bradford.

Presently, there is no CCTV at the premises in question although it is understood that North Parade is covered by street CCTV. We will consult with West Yorkshire Police and if it is deemed necessary the appropriate security system will be installed. Initial discussions that we have had with the Police have not identified an absolute need for the use of CCTV and we would stress that the dynamic of The Sparrow will be that of a sophisticated, specialist and stylish bar. It is certainly hoped that a certain type of clientele will not be attracted to the environment created.
