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1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report seeks to update members on current casualty levels and trends in Bradford East and on the Road Safety education, training and publicity initiatives aimed at reducing these casualties.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 A report on proposals for the devolution of Road Safety funding was considered by the Bradford East Area Committee on 22 November 2012. At the meeting members resolved to support an evidence based approach to determine Road Safety priorities. It was also resolved to present an annual 'State of the Nation' style report detailing casualty numbers/trends and details of ongoing and proposed road safety education, training and publicity initiatives to the Area Committee.
- 2.2 The West Yorkshire Local Transport Plan set a target to reduce the number of fatal and serious road casualties in West Yorkshire by 50% by 2026. This reduction target uses the 2005 2009 average figure as a baseline. For the Bradford district this equates to a reduction from 248 to 124 casualties.
- 2.3 A 'Road Casualties' report is published annually. Based on Police Road Traffic Collision records the report identifies casualty reduction priorities for the District. This report takes into account the most recent full year data available, i.e. 2017, and trends in comparison to preceding years.
- 2.4 In 2017 there was an overall decrease in casualties in the Bradford District and the long term downward trend has been maintained. This mirrors the long term downward trend for West Yorkshire. Appendix 1 shows the present position for the Bradford District.
- 2.5 In Braford East there was an overall decrease in casualties and, as with the District, the long term trend is downward. Appendix 2 shows the present position for Bradford East.
- 2.6 Public Health (PH) now provides financial support for the Road Safety Team. An Inter Departmental Agreement has been agreed linking the Road Safety Team programme with PH outcomes which include; killed and serious injuries, hospital admissions caused by unintentional injury, infant mortality and mortality rate from causes considered preventable.
- 2.7 The Road Safety Team operates on a district-wide basis. Staff and financial resources are allocated to education, training and publicity programmes based on priorities identified for greatest impact on casualty reduction. Between August 2017 and July 2018 the team delivered the programmes set out in Appendix 3. These programmes are highlighted in the Bradford Metropolitan District Road Safety Plan, which is supported by the Area Committees.
- 2.8 Car occupants account for the highest number of casualties and are targeted

through publicity campaigns and enforcement. Education and training initiatives, delivered at local level, target the 0-19 age group through work with schools, other educational establishments, youth organisations, multi-agency partnerships and Area Coordinator teams.

3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Engagement with schools

3.1 The team provides a three tier district wide service. The first tier is where schools in the top eight wards with the highest child casualties are targeted. The second tier is the delivery of presentations by the team which are booked on a first come first served basis. The third tier is the provision of resources and information for all schools which does not need a road safety officer to deliver. Appendix 4 shows the first and second tier engagement with schools by ward, based on a two year rotation.

Activities in Bradford East during 2017 - 2018

- 3.2 In Bradford East activities in primary schools focused on pedestrian safety sessions and there was a strong take up for the practical pedestrian training for Year 3. A number of schools also ran Bikeability courses. There was also a strong take up of Theatre in Education performances by secondary schools for Year 7 which addressed pedestrian safety.
- 3.3 In 2018 2019 the team, will continue to address key issues in Bradford East identified from the Annual Road Casualties Report, through the activities outlined in Appendix 3.
- 3.4 Given the relatively small data set for user and demographic groups for individual constituencies, district wide casualty data is more generally used to inform some intervention priorities.
- 3.5 The West Yorkshire Safer Roads Delivery Group, which comprises of Road Safety Officers from each district, the police and Fire and Rescue, delivers regional road safety campaigns which are data led. Analysis of casualties and causation factors has continued to highlight the vulnerability of 11-12 year old pedestrians with failure to look properly being a major contributory factor. This was addressed through Theatre in Education targeting year 7 students.

Safer Roads schemes

3.6 The Traffic & Highways Area Teams deliver a programme of Safer Roads engineering measures such as traffic calming, pedestrian and cycle facilities, speed limit reductions and parking management. These schemes are funded through the Single Transport Plan and are largely evidence-based to ensure best value in terms of casualty reduction. The Safer Roads schemes programmes are the subject of separate reports to the Area Committees.

4. FINANCIAL & RESOURCE APPRAISAL

4.1 The Road Safety budget allocation for education, training and publicity resources for 2018/19 is £33,700. This also covers contributions to wider West Yorkshire and Yorkshire and Humber campaigns and initiatives that have an impact on the Bradford District.

5. RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES

- 5.1 Budget spend on Road Safety is currently prioritised against overall district casualty reduction priorities which are based on analysis of statistical data relating to road casualties. This analysis, underpinned by the District Road Safety Plan priorities, is used to establish key themes of a district-based approach for the following 12 month period. It is anticipated that a failure to maintain this approach would have a detrimental effect on future casualty prevention/reduction.
- 5.2 Without continued strategic use of resources the ability of the Council to achieve value for money through procurement savings as well as participating in partnership working on West Yorkshire and Yorkshire and Humber campaigns, initiatives and events would be at risk.

6. LEGAL APPRAISAL

6.1 The ongoing activities of the Road Safety team contribute to the Council's duties under the Road Traffic Act 1988.

7. OTHER IMPLICATIONS

7.1 EQUALITY & DIVERSITY

The Road Safety Team provides a diverse range of road safety programmes and activities that engage with individuals from across the Bradford East area.

7.2 SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Improvements in road safety conditions encourage a shift to more sustainable transport modes.

Any increases in walking, cycling or public transport use encouraged by road safety improvements would have a positive impact on reducing Greenhouse Gas emissions.

1.0 SUMMARY

1.1 This report considers an application for a Disabled Persons Parking Place where the application has received an objection.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Council has received an application for a Disabled Persons Parking Place from the occupant of 27 Wingfield Mount. The resident who lives here is registered disabled, receives PIP at the higher rate, holds a current Disabled Person's Blue Badge and has a vehicle registered at the property. There is no off-street parking at these premises.
- 2.2 A plan showing the indicative location of a Disabled Persons Parking Place outside 27 Wingfield Mount as Appendix 1.

3.0 OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1 The applicant has a number of on-going medical conditions which they maintain necessitates the provision of a disabled persons parking space..
- 3.2 As part of the Disabled Persons Parking Place application investigation process, officers undertake consultations with adjacent neighbours to determine if there are any objections to the proposal. An objection has been received to this application; the points of objection are summarised below:
 - i. It is alleged that the applicant does not own a vehicle and that the requested parking space is for a relative.
 - ii. It is alleged that relatives of the occupants, both living on the same street and elsewhere, *do* often park their cars outside the property.
 - iii. On-street parking on Wingfield Mount is already at a premium.
 - iv. The turning head at the end of the street is already used for parking and it is expected that this would be exacerbated by the proposal.
 - v. An existing Disabled Persons Parking Place on Wingfield Mount is already used by vehicles not displaying blue badges, as such the objector is concern that an additional such space will be similarly abused.



1.0 SUMMARY

1.1 This report considers a petition requesting the closure of Westfield Lane, Bradford.

2.0 BACKGROUND

Petition: Westfield Lane (79 signatures)

- 2.1 The petitioners are requesting the Council to close Westfield Lane to through traffic to improve safety and the quality of life for all who live and work on Westfield Lane, Bradford. The petition states that Westfield Lane has become a dangerous through route and that the existing traffic measures do not address vehicle speeds and dangerous driving on Westfield Lane. A copy of the full wording of the petition is shown in Appendix 1 and a location plan is attached as Appendix 2.
- 2.2 Westfield Lane is some 1.9km long stretching from Town Lane and Highfield Road in Idle to Wrose Road in Wrose. It is therefore partly in the Bradford East and partly in the Shipley Area Committee areas. Approximately 80% of the petitioners live in the Bradford East area. Westfield Lane is residential for the majority of its length except for the section from Wrosecliffe Grove to Welwyn Avenue where there are a stables and fields. This is where the boundary changes. There is a series of round top road humps on Westfield Lane between properties numbered 94 and 191, covering a distance of 500 metres. This section is in the Bradford East area. These features have been in place for over 10 years.
- 2.3 There has been one recorded road incident causing slight injury in the last five years on Westfield Lane. This was a collision at the junction with Welwyn Avenue, Wrose.
- 2.4 Information on the speed and volume of traffic using Westfield Lane has been gathered using an automatic data logger.

Data was collected in October 2017 on the section of Westfield Lane to the south of Wrosecliffe Grove near the stables. The average volume of two-way traffic over 4 days was 2120 (1107 in the direction of Wrose and 1013 towards Idle). The average speed of traffic was 26mph and 85% of traffic was travelling at or below 30mph.

Data has been collected more recently for 4 days between 17 and 20 May 2018 (Thursday to Sunday) near the Hepworth Idle cricket ground at the Idle end of the road. The average two-way traffic volume was 2747 (1334 in the direction of Wrose and 1413 towards Idle). The average speed of traffic was 25mph and 85% of traffic was travelling at or below 29mph.

These figures do not give cause for concern on a 30mph residential route. Also, given that Westfield Lane forms part of a network of roads serving sizeable residential areas, a significant proportion of traffic will be generated by residents themselves.

- 2.5 The closure of Westfield Lane would affect a large number of residents who would need to find alternative routes between Wrose, Shipley and Idle. All affected residents would need to be consulted on any potential closure and their views considered. The inconvenience caused would need to be weighed up against any envisaged benefits. Some of the alternative routes available although less rural in nature already give cause for concern in terms of traffic speeds and road injuries. Inevitably the closure of one route to through traffic will increase traffic volumes on other roads some of which may be equally undesirable alternative routes leading to requests for other through routes to also be closed.
- 2.6 The Bradford East Area Committee only has a limited amount of funding to address traffic related concerns raised by residents. Priority is currently given to sites where there are significant numbers of road injuries and where specific engineering interventions are predicted to have casualty reduction benefits. There is an even lesser budget for traffic management measures where there are community safety concerns that have not necessarily materialised into a significant collisions record but, for instance, vehicle speeds are above acceptable tolerances. It would be difficult to recommend prioritisation of resources to an area with some existing traffic calming measures, little casualty reduction potential, and no evidence of excessive speed.

3.0 OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

3.1 Local ward members have been consulted. A local councillor has commented that a closure has been considered before but residents were against the inconvenience which would be caused particularly getting to Wrose. They also feel that if this went ahead many requests would be received for road closures from residents of other roads used as through routes. They suggest doing surveys and finding out what the public think of the idea.



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1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report updates the Area Committee on changes to the apportionment of the Safer Roads budget (recently approved by the Executive) and seeks approval for a programme of schemes in Bradford East for 2018/19.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The West Yorkshire Transport Strategy 2040 was approved by the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA) in August 2017. In conjunction with the Strategic Economic Plan, the overarching aim of the strategy is "...for Leeds City Region to be a globally recognised economy where good growth delivers high levels of prosperity, jobs and quality of life for everyone."
- 2.2 The key objectives of the strategy are:

Economy: Create a more reliable, less congested, better connected transport network.

Environment: Have a positive impact on our built and natural environment.

People and place: Put people first to create a strong sense of place.

- 2.3 In term of Safer Roads themes, the strategy includes a specific aim to reduce road accidents, aspiring to 'zero tolerance' of transport-related deaths. There are also aspirations to encourage walking and cycling by improving safety.
- 2.4 The Strategy retains the casualty reduction target first introduce by the Local Transport Plan, i.e. a 50% reduction in the number of people killed or seriously injured in road collisions (KSI) by 2026.
- 2.5 Historically there were specific budgets for the promotion of Casualty Reduction schemes and more general Traffic Management Measures. Following a significant reduction in the level of funding, this was combined into a single funding stream. Executive devolved the budget to the Area Committees on the basis of population split in October 2012, with a provision that 70% of the budget had to be allocated to Casualty Reduction schemes, the residual funding being available for projects prioritised by members.
- 2.6 The prioritisation of funding for Casualty Reduction schemes has been an important contributor to the continuing downward trend in casualty rates within the district. This has been achieved in partnership with other interventions including Police enforcement and Road Safety education, training and publicity activities. However, the current level of funding dictates that individual Area Committees are restricted in the scale of projects that can be prioritised. The current system also precludes the development of projects of more strategic significance or on a district-wide basis.
- 2.7 There has been a systematic addressing of locations with notable clusters of recorded traffic collisions. As such, the occurrence of collisions is becoming more sporadic and thus more difficult to target with specific area committee based interventions. Notwithstanding this it is acknowledged that there remains a safety

benefit in delivering traffic management schemes in areas where casualty rates are not necessarily high, but where there are concerns about vehicle speeds, severance or more general safety issues.

- 2.8 In order to address the issues highlighted in paragraphs 2.6 and 2.7 the following revisions to the Safer Roads budget allocation and scheme governance systems for 2018/19 onwards were approved by Executive committee on 12 June 2018:
 - Establish a top-slice of the Safer Roads budget to enable the promotion of strategic or district-wide projects, with the approval to promote such projects and consideration of any resulting objections being an Executive Member function.
 - Maintain the existing allocation for project development
 - Residual funding to be distributed to the Area Committees for them to continue promoting Casualty Reduction schemes as a priority. Each Area Committee will retain an indicative sum of £50,000 (per area) for general traffic management measures, with this figure being flexible when all viable Casualty Reduction projects have been prioritised.

3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1 The Safer Roads budget forms part of a package of works known as implementation plans (IP). These have previously been 3yr plans, however the current plan (IP3) is for a 5yr period. IP2 ran from 2014/15 to 2016/17; all Safer Roads projects in Bradford East approved for promotion in that period have now been completed with the exception of 2 schemes as follows:
 - Shipley-Airedale Road/Barkerend Road red-light violation camera which was not recommend for progression by the West Yorkshire Safety Camera partnership on account of other planned improvement works at the junction.
 - Killinghall Road/Fagley Road junction improvement which proved unfeasible due to the requirement for 3rd party land.
 - It is recommended that these projects are formally abandoned by the Area Committee.
- 3.2 The approved 2017/18 area-wide Traffic Regulation Order for Bradford East included an item for the installation of waiting restrictions on Kings Gate. Following investigations and initial consultations it was concluded that there was little evidence to support the installation of restrictions and that the proposal would be detrimental to nearby businesses.
 - It is recommended that this proposal be formally abandoned by the Area Committee.

- 3.3 It is recommended that the Area Committee re-affirms its commitment to progressing Disabled Persons Parking Places and undertaking mobility access improvement works by again including budgets for these within the 2018/19 programme. The cost of any traffic surveys required to assess requests for traffic management measures and assist in determining future schemes programmes will also need to be met from this budget.
- 3.4 It is also suggested that the successful exercise of promoting a constituency-wide Traffic Regulation Order, to include a number of sites where minor amendments to waiting restrictions have been requested, be repeated in 2018/19. (Due to the more extensive processes involved, it would not be feasible to include any larger schemes or Residents Permit Parking Schemes within the constituency-wide Order).

4. FINANCIAL & RESOURCE APPRAISAL

4.1 The strategic schemes top-slice has been set at £120,000 for 2018/19 by Executive. Residual funding is allocated to the Area Committee's based on 2011 census population figures as follows:

Area	Population %
Bradford West	22.0
Bradford South	19.4
Bradford East	21.8
Shipley	18.2
Keighley	18.6

- 4.2 This apportionment results in a total budget of £122,892 for Bradford East. The individual budgets are therefore £72,892 for Casualty Reduction schemes and £50,000 for other community priority schemes
- 4.3 The Council's allocation for IP2 has been fully expended. As such there is no residual funding to allocate from that period.

5. RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES

5.1 A failure to follow an evidence-based approach and prioritise schemes on the basis of casualty reduction potential would not meet with the overarching aims of the Safer Roads allocation

6. LEGAL APPRAISAL

6.1 There are no specific issues arising from this report. The course of action proposed is in general accordance with the Councils power as Highway Authority and Traffic Regulation Authority. The Council's commitment to taking into account the needs of all road users, including those with special mobility needs, is referred to in the body of this report.

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7. OTHER IMPLICATIONS

7.1 EQUALITY & DIVERSITY

Due consideration is given to Section 149 of the Equality Act 2010 when developing all Safer Roads schemes.

7.2 SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Safer Roads projects are designed to minimise future maintenance implications and the impact on the environment.

7.3 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS IMPACTS

The implementation of highway safety schemes and projects which encourage sustainable transport modes will potentially reduce harmful emissions.

Such measures, along with partnership activities, form an integral part of improving safety in local communities. 1. Summary

1.1 This report outlines the allocation of the Community Chest Budget for the financial year 2017/2018 and asks Members to consider the make-up of the Grants Advisory Group in the Bradford East Area for 2018/2019.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Community Chest Budget assists and enables a wide range of community initiatives to be developed to benefit communities in the Bradford East Area.
- 2.2 The Community Chest Budget allocated to the Bradford East Area Coordinator's Office for 2017 / 2018 was £11,500.
- 2.3 Applications that meet the published criteria are considered from community groups and organisations and sometimes from individuals living and benefiting the Bradford East Area.
- 2.4 The Area Co-ordinator, or designated officer, is responsible for making the decisions on the Community Chest applications received. These decisions are made in consultation with the Grants Advisory Group whose membership is made up of three Elected Members, reflecting the political make up of the Bradford East Area Committee. In previous years the Chair and Deputy Chair and the Opposition Spokesperson have made up the Grants Advisory Group.
- 2.5 Interest in and the demand on the Community Chest Fund continues to be extremely high. Over the years, the Community Chest Fund has been well used by local community and voluntary organisations and individuals. Numerous activities and events have been supported which otherwise may have been difficult to run.

3. Other considerations

- 3.1 During the financial year 2017/2018, 35 applications for Community Chest Grants were awarded to community groups, a breakdown of which is shown in appendix A.
- 3.2 In reviewing the Community Chest grant allocation for 2017 / 2018, it is important to note the high demand on the fund available to Bradford East Area Co-ordinator's Office. Owing to the high demand on the limited Community Chest fund it has been a practice of the Bradford East Area Co-ordinator, or designated officer, in consultation with the Grants Advisory Group, to make a contribution towards the total cost of the activity and to only occasionally approve the full amount requested.

4. Options

4.1 That Members note the report.

5. Financial and resource appraisal

- 5.1 Financial
- 5.1.1 In 2017/2018 the Community Chest funding allocated was £11,500 plus an additional £250 that was returned as not spent from the previous year. Therefore, a total of £11,750 Community Chest funding was available.

5.1.2 The 2018 / 2019 Community Chest Fund is £11,500. The Fund is frequently match funded by contributions from other Council Departments, external funders and fundraising by the local community groups applying.

5.2 **Staffing**

5.2.1 Officer support is provided from the Area Co-ordinator's Office from within existing resources.

6. Legal appraisal

6.1 There are no legal implications.

7.1 Equal Rights

7.1.1 Community Chest Grants enable local organisations to provide activities and services in response to identified local needs. 

Summary of the Bolton & Undercliffe Ward Assessment

Community Strengths	The Greenwood Centre is now under new management arrangements supported by Ward Councillors, Inspired Neighbourhoods and other partners. A range of actions are being undertaken to secure investment, develop services for young people, older people and retain space for the wider community usage. There are a number of community based organisations supported by volunteers working across the Ward. Active citizenship is healthy in the ward as a whole but support for existing volunteers and to community based groups and organisations, and to increase volunteering, will continue to be needed.
Clean	There are far fewer incidents of littering and flytipping (dumping) than in other wards although people continue to perceive littering as a big problem. There is a slightly lower than district average of residents using the doorstep recycling service. Dog fouling is consistently raised as an issue by people.
Safe	Burglary is the main, ongoing crime across the ward along with theft of motor vehicle. Residents tend to be satisfied with the Police and other agencies who deal with anti-social behaviour but see drugs as a problem and feel unsafe after dark locally. Speeding and inappropriate and dangerous parking outside schools and places of worship are regularly raised as an issue.
Active	Obesity in children entering year 6 at school is higher than the district average as is the proportion of people who have difficulty finding the money to heat their homes.
Incomes employment and housing	There are concerns about proposed new housing as part of the Canal Road Corridor improvements and the impact this will have on traffic and local services including schools and health.
Children and young people	Although opportunities to exist for young people to engage in positive activities such as youth clubs and sports, more is felt to be needed to divert them away from anti-social behaviour and crime. Attainment of grades A to C in GCSE's is lower than the district average and it is felt aspiration and attainment could be improved.
Stronger Communities	The population of the ward is skewed towards older people as well as more White, mixed race, Indian and 'other' ethnic groups than the district average. The majority of community based groups are linked to faith organisations, mainly Churches.
Further information	There is always more that could be said about Bolton and Undercliffe. This Ward Plan captures some of the key challenges, local services, community based work and is backed up by statistical information from West Yorkshire Observatory. (http://www.westyorkshireobservatory.org)



Summary of the Bowling and Barkerend Ward Assessment

Community Strengths

The Bowling and Barkerend ward connects and leads into the Bradford City Centre and is a key gateway linking Leeds and Bradford. There are strong community organisations including Community works, Karmand Centre, Otley Road and Barkerend Environment Group, The Anchor Project, The Vine, Bangladeshi Community Association and several active residents groups. Within the Karmand Centre there is a large outdoor cricket area run by the BD3 Sports Association. In addition, there are two children's centres in the Ward which are now run independently of the Council. The school community provides a useful platform for engagement and gives opportunities for partnership working within schools. Many of the schools have community rooms / spaces and offer a range of activities to parents e.g. sewing, ICT, exercise etc. Compared to other Wards of Bradford, with the exception of the adjoining Ward of Bradford Moor, the area has significantly high numbers of faith buildings (mosques, temples and churches). The ward benefits from very strong active citizenship through the faith sector. There are opportunities to increase active citizenship across the ward; in some areas this would need more support and encouragement, using different methods to reach the hard to reach. Some of this could be achieved by continuing to improve through day to day work of Council Wardens, Ward Officer, Community Development workers, Youth Workers, parental support workers engaging one to one with residents on their environmental and community safety issues, connecting them with services; also through specific projects\clean ups in areas where residents want to see change. This could be developed to help sustain the work. There are a range of good parks and outdoor spaces Bowling Park, Beech Grove, Upper Seymour Street Recreation Ground, woodlands and other smaller play areas across the Ward.

Clean

Residents not taking responsibility for the cleanliness of streets, including un-adopted backstreets and other public spaces (dropping or not picking up litter and dumping unwanted waste items on verges streets and open spaces rather than using waste sites or Bulk Waste collections) remain a priority. Environmental issues such as street litter, feeding vermin, untidy gardens, fly-tipping and waste around fast food premises are commonly raised at community engagement events by Wardens, Councillors and other community groups and also remain a significant issue across the ward. Trade waste containment and litter from fast-food take-away premises continue to be a big issue particularly along key gateways such as Leeds Road, Barkerend Road, Killinghall Road and associated side streets. There has been an increase in new food businesses. Surprisingly, 91.2% of people in the Ward are overall satisfied with the local area and this is higher than the Bradford East Area and District averages of 80.5% and 86.8 respectively. Residents who perceive litter or rubbish as a problem at 30% is relatively higher than the District average (26.2%) but below the Bradford East Area average (26.2%). The percentage of streets failing on litter is high for the Ward (23.2%) compared against the Bradford East area (19.1%) and double the district average (11.8%). The ward ranks top in the district for reported fly-tipping the

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	Bradford District as more residents are now logging complaints formally with the Council. The number of fly-tipping hotspots has actually decreased as residents are more informed about how to report environmental concerns to the Council.
Safe	Overall there has been a downward crime trend across the ward i.e. less crimes. However, the percentage of overall crime ranks the Ward in the top five within the district wide. Most community tensions raised within the ward relate to perceptions of high levels of anti-social behaviour associated with driving, speeding and parking as well as drugs related activities. Low levels of engagement between residents and local services makes creating positive changes in deprived communities more difficult. Previous user satisfaction survey highlights the percentage of people who are satisfied with how the Police dealt with the issue they reported (86.9%) ranked the Bowling and Barkerend the top most satisfied Ward against other Neighbourhood Policing Teams (NPTs).
Active	The all age, all cause mortality rate per 1000 population is higher than the Bradford East average and district average. The diabetes hospital admission ranks the high across the district. This is reflective of the population make up for the ward. Coronary heart disease mortality, people who find it difficult finding money to pay for heating and hot water and birth rates are high. Lack of access to NHS dentists across the area is an issue and people find it difficult to get GP appointments when they need them, which probably lead to inappropriate use of the local hospital A&E department. People have access to information on healthy lifestyles (diet and exercise) but there remains much to be done to create positive behaviour changes that impact on health. It is particularly difficult to engage men and Eastern European residents on health issues.
Incomes employment and housing	According to the Index of Multiple Deprivation 2011, Bowling and Barkerend has very high levels of deprivation. All of the ward's population live in neighbourhoods that fall within the 20% most deprived in England. The ward is ranked 4 th most deprived out of 30 wards in Bradford in terms of its average deprivation scores. It also ranks badly across all seven domains which make up the multiple deprivation score. There is an increasing East European population drawn to the area by cheap, poor quality private rented housing, often with informal tenancy arrangements. There is a need for more support to make people job-ready and into training and employment. In terms of housing a proportionately high number of privately owned homes are empty for lengthy periods compared to other areas, whilst social housing is popular locally with a high number of 'bids' per property available. Exploitation of people in housing need on limited income leads to overcrowded and poor quality housing being occupied, often by central and eastern European migrants. Advice services and ESOL classes help address these issues, but again more is needed.
Children and	The birth rate in ward is higher than the Bradford East Area and district averages. Qualification rates for young people leaving school are low and work with NEET (not in employment education or training)

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young people	young people aims to help create young people than are ready for training and employment. Statistically children living in poverty ranks the ward in the top five district wide. A higher proportion of young people than the district average become 'looked after' by the Local Authority. More work is needed to impact on obesity in children and young people. Although there are a number of youth projects and clubs across the ward but more is needed, particularly to draw in girls and young women.
Stronger Communities	Volunteering overall is low across the Ward. However, there are many people involved with faith based organisations as volunteers delivering community benefit activities which might not be seen as volunteering by those taking part in this work. There is a need to improve active citizens within the Ward. There are some very successful projects in the area such as the Friends of Bowling Park who have developed a strong network of volunteers that take part in activities ranging from litter picking, running a café, gardening club to fun days and youth engagement activities. The population ethnicity mix White, South Asian and Eastern European communities is a challenge. This diversity creates challenges, in an area where it is felt that people from different backgrounds don't necessarily get on well or treat each other with respect and there are community tensions.



Summary of the Bradford Moor Ward Assessment

The Bradford Moor ward connects and leads into the Bradford City Centre and is a key gateway **Community** linking Leeds and Bradford. There are a range of community organisations including The **Strengths** Thornbury Centre which acts as a hub for the Ward delivering a broad range of service provisions, Thornbury Youth and Community Centre, Bradford Moor PASS (based at Attock Park) and some other third sector groups. There is a children's centre in the Ward at Mortimer House. The area is well served with several schools across the ward, a mix of state and private educational establishments. The school community provides a useful platform for engagement and gives opportunities for partnership working within schools. Many of the schools have community rooms / spaces and offer a range of activities to parents sewing, ICT, exercise etc. Compared to other Wards of Bradford, but similar to the adjoining ward of Bowling and Barkerend, the area has significantly high numbers of faith buildings (mosques, temples and churches). The ward benefits from very strong active citizenship through the faith sector e.g. Sant Nirankari volunteers group do occasional litter picks / cleanups in their surrounding area. The level of volunteering is low and investment by residents in their neighbourhood is low in terms of community involvement in helping address local community concerns. However there is voluntary involvement in a range of activities including volunteering on a street level, through community groups and faith based organisations and some of this might not have been seen by the individuals concerned as volunteering. There are certainly opportunities to increase active citizenship across the ward; in some areas this would need more support and encouragement, using different methods to reach the hard to reach. Some of this could be achieved by continuing to improve through day to day work of Council Wardens, Ward Officer, Community Development workers, Youth Workers, parental support workers engaging one to one with residents on their environmental and community safety issues, connecting them with services; also through specific projects\clean ups in areas where residents want to see change. This could be developed to help sustain the work. There are a range of good parks and outdoor spaces Bradford Moor Park, Myrashay, Woodhall Recreation Grounds etc. Morrison's head offices are based within the ward at Gain Lane. The ward has access to a diverse range of businesses, shops and food places. Residents generally not taking responsibility for the cleanliness of streets, including un-adopted Clean backstreets in terms of dropping or not picking up litter and dumping unwanted waste items on backstreets, verges and open spaces rather than using waste sites or Bulk Waste collections (which are now being charged for, other than for electrical items). Trade waste arrangements are inadequate or non existent for a number of businesses. Anecdotally we are aware that East Europeans residents in rented housing get blamed for furniture and household waste being

	dumped in yards and on verges by other residents. This can be the result of landlords not clearing houses between tenancies, leaving the problem for the new tenants to deal with. This can have an impact on the nature of a neighbourhood and how people get along, and is a wider community problem. Low levels of engagement between residents and local services and the types of engagement and a lack of experience of 'self-help' makes creating positive changes in this deprived community more difficult to kick start and then keep going. The Bradford Moor Ward ranks top district wide for street litter failure and ranks second highest for reported fly-tipping. More work is needed to encourage residents to recycle. Residents should be supported to develop self-help approaches.
Safe	Overall crime statistics evidence a downward crime trend. However, despite this significant issues of anti social behaviour and illegal drug dealing impact negatively on feelings of safety and probably the low level of satisfaction in Police and other services dealing with ASB. Low satisfaction with Police and other services dealing with anti-social behaviour could be linked to high levels and concern about anti social behaviour and street drug dealing / drug running. Concern about teenagers hanging around on streets, in parks and open spaces which can feel / be intimidating or aggressive is also something that young people themselves mentioned when taking part in a Youth Service consultation. People feeling unsafe after dark, including young people is perhaps also linked to levels of crime and anti social behaviour. Drivers not using seat belts or child restraints, parking irresponsibly and reacting negatively (sometimes abusively) continues to be a challenge. Bradford Moor is one of three Better Start Bradford Wards. Children aged under 3 years old in the Better Start area are more likely to be brought up in an environment where domestic abuse occurs compared to Bradford district.
Active	High rate of a number serious, life threatening health conditions including diabetes, coronary heart disease and obesity which impact on mortality rates and quality of life. High birth rate. Isolation and depression may be linked to family lifestyles, lack of occupation and levels of poor health. Though people say they feel encouraged to be physically active the need for support / encouragement of healthy lifestyle choices is ongoing. Bradford Moor is one of three Better Start Bradford Wards. The communities in the Better Start Area have a lower life expectancy than in Bradford district and, for males, there is a significant difference been the expected life span in the Better Start area compared to local and national figures. The Better Start area has a high infant mortality rate with 9 infants dying per 1,000 live births compared to 4.6 per 1,000 in England between 2009 and 2011. There are higher rates of obesity in both Reception and Year 6 in the Better Start area compared to Bradford and England. The three Better Start wards account for 19% of all admissions to hospital following injury for 0-3 year olds across Bradford district and also

	have higher rates of A&E attendances for 0-4yrs than for the district. The Better Start children have poorer oral health with, on average, 3.2-4.0 decayed, missing or filled teeth per child aged under 5 years old. This data clearly indicates that children in the Better Start area are much less healthy compared to children within Bradford district as a whole and Bradford district itself is worse compared to regionally and nationally in many child health outcome areas.
Incomes employment and housing	High level of benefit claimants and low household income leads to worry about amount of debt and covering costs of heating etc. Overcrowded households are juxtaposed with a high level of empty homes across the ward and a low number of bids for social housing.
Children and young people	High youth and young adult population means a significant and appropriate level of services for children and young people are needed. The high level of children receiving free school meals is due to low household incomes, positive role models are needed. Obesity from year 6 onward is linked to diet, sedentary lifestyles and easy availability of cheap fast food. Low educational attainment and lack of aspiration; positive role models are needed. The Better Start Area Wellbeing Profile highlights over half of the children aged 5 years old or under in this area have poor social and emotional development compared to one in three children in Bradford. In the same survey, one in five children had poor communication, language and literacy compared to the district average of one in ten. We know already domestic abuse and child protection rates are higher in the Bradford Moor Ward and are aware from other research by Born in Bradford that White mothers are more likely to smoke and drink alcohol and this applies to many mothers of White Other ethnicity.
Stronger Communities	Volunteering overall is low across the Ward similar to the neighbouring ward of Bowling and Barkerend. However, there are many people involved with faith based organisations as volunteers delivering community benefit activities which might not be seen as volunteering by those taking part in this work. There is also evidence of some volunteering through local centres such as the Thornbury Centre Hub but there is a need to encourage and support volunteers to engage helping to build their capacity. The population ethnicity mix White, South Asian and Eastern European communities is a challenge. This diversity creates challenges, in an area where it is felt that people from different backgrounds don't necessarily get on well or treat each other with respect and there are community tensions.



Summary of the Idle & Thackley Ward Assessment

Population	The Idle & Thackley ward consists of six neighbourhoods which are: lower part of Thorpe Edge, Idle, Idle Moor, Cote Farm estate, Thackley and Apperely Bridge.
	93% of the population are predominantly white with small pockets of mixed ethnicity throughout the ward. The population of 25 to 69 year olds has moderately increased is significantly higher in comparison to other wards within Bradford East and district wide. The younger population of 5 to 14 year old has moderately increased whilst the population of 0 to 4 year old and 15 to 24 year old has seen a moderate reduction in comparison to other areas within Bradford East and district wide.
Community Strengths	Two primary roads through Idle & Thackley provide good arterial commuting inks to Bradford, Shipley, Leeds and Leeds Bradford Airport. The introduction of a new railway station at Apperley Bridge has enhanced public

	transport links between Bradford and Leeds. The semi rural locations of Idle, Thackley, Greengates and Apperley Bridge provide an opportunity for a variety of outdoor activities including walking and horse riding. Idle village centre has been identified as a Conservation Area and provides its residents and visitors with a good variety of shops, pubs and two supermarkets. In 2015 the Wright Watson Centre opened its doors and now hosts a number of business enterprises, community based projects and a public library.





Summary of the Little Horton Ward issues

Community Strength	Community led initiatives include Bradford Trident, Trident Community Council, Parkside Community Association, Marshfield Neighbourhood Association, West Bowling Advice and Training Centre, West Bowling Youth Initiative, MAPA, Light of the World Centre, Madni Centre, West End Centre, Bowling Old Lane Cricket Club, Khidmat Centre and SHINE. Bradford Trident is the largest community led organisation in the Ward and supports Trident Community Council, the local Parish Council. The residents of Little Horton come from a range of cultural, religious and ethnic backgrounds. Bradford Trident own a number of community buildings, they employ a part time community development worker and facilitate the BD5 Faith Forum. Trident has successfully led a community based partnership that has drawn in 10 years of Lottery funding (£49 million) for work with families with children 0 – 4 years in Little Horton, Bowling, Barkerend and Bradford Moor, three of the most deprived wards in Bradford. The programme, known as Better Start Bradford, started running its programme and projects from Summer 2015.
Clean	Little Horton faces a number of challenges in terms of cleaner and greener issues. Littering, and flytipping (dumping) of household items and other waste is much higher than the Bradford District average. Flytipping reports are only higher in Bowling and Barkerend ward, and local people see both this and the amount of littering as a problem. Cleanliness of green spaces and recreation areas is also raised by people and services locally as needing attention. There is a need to get more residents understanding and using the kerbside recycling service properly. Putting food out for birds in public places, leaving waste in gardens and yards and dirty backstreets gives a poor impression of the area as well as attracting vermin. Little Horton is the 2 nd most densely populated ward (after City ward) and in some neighbourhoods this is even more obvious, for example in streets with families living in back-to-back housing. Some of the cleanliness issues are exacerbated by landlords not taking responsibility for the homes they own and rent out (not clearing out previous tenants furniture and possessions), by residents who either don't speak English very well, or not being long term residents they don't understand how local services (such as recycling) work, or know how to access and use them (e.g. the Household Waste sites). Community litter picks are supported by Wardens, Clean Team, Councillors and Community Council as well as local residents and we are keen to encourage and support as much of this as possible with local people, alongside educational work, and enforcement where needed.
Safe	Illegal drug dealing and use and anti-social behaviour are regularly raised and dealt with through the Ward Partnership Team. Figures from the Police Analyst show that drugs, violence offences and house burglary are high compared to other areas and seem to be increasing. There are also concerns that Eastern European

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	residents in particular have different lifestyles and different understanding of what constitutes acceptable behaviour which seems to be at odds particularly with Asian Muslim resident's way of life. Activities for young people to provide positive alternatives to hanging about aimlessly on streets and public spaces are available, but perhaps not attractive to some of the young people whose behaviour is more problematic. Inappropriate parking at and around schools, Children's Centre and places of worship, including on footways and junctions, leads to safety issues and creates community tensions.
Active	Mortality per thousand population is higher in Little Horton than Bradford District as a whole with both infant and under 75's mortality high. One of the impacts of the 'multiple deprivation' is that many residents of Little Horton experience reduced life expectancy. The ward has high levels of Coronary Heart Disease. Obesity in school aged children at year 6, and the general population contributes to the high level of diabetes. There is a lack of access to NHS dentists across the area. Residents are given information and advice on healthy lifestyles (diet and exercise) through many Community Centre sessions and the work of local schools, but there remains much to be done to create and sustain positive behaviour changes that impact on health. It is particularly difficult to engage both men and Eastern European residents on health issues.
Incomes employment and housing	There are high levels of welfare benefit claimants, including Job Seekers Allowance in Little Horton ward. 18-24year old claimants are the 2 nd highest in the district after Manningham ward, JSA claimants are the 3 rd highest in the district after Bowling & Barkerend and Manningham wards. There is a need for on-going support to make people, including young people, job-ready and get them into training and employment, and a number of centres provide this support. Little Horton is 9 th highest in the district for the number of empty homes, although rented housing is comparatively cheap. Across the district 64% housing is owner occupied, this is likely to be lower in Little Horton, with social housing a good option locally, and this likely to be better quality than private rented housing. Exploitation of people in housing need on limited income leads to overcrowded and poor quality housing being occupied, often by central and eastern European migrants, who may not have a formal tenancy agreements. Advice services and ESOL classes help address these issues, but again more is needed. The numbers of young people not in education, training or employment are the 3 rd highest in Little Horton, after Tong and Eccleshill wards, in Bradford district.
Children and young people	There is a high birth rate and young population in Little Horton and many families live in poverty, this is why it has been included in the Better Start Bradford area and is getting additional investment in support and services for families with children 0 – 4 year olds. Qualification rates for young people leaving school are low and work with NEET (not in employment education or training) young people, aims to help ready them for

training and employment, this is run through a range of local community and youth organisations including the Youth Service. Work to impact on obesity rates in children and young people takes place through a range of organisations. It is difficult to see what impact this is having as families cooking meals and cookery skills generally seem to have withered in the face of the plethora of cheap, fast food outlets locally that do not often provide the healthiest food choices. It seems difficult to counteract this. There are a number of youth projects and clubs across the ward but these are not able to help all the young people in need, a particular gap being provision for and drawing in young women and girls.

Stronger Communities

The ward has the 2nd highest population in the district after City ward. The highest proportion of residents are Asian, with less than 50% being white, and a much smaller number identifying as Black African, mixed or other ethnic origins. The area has a number of residents from Central and Eastern European countries, focused in West Bowling, and attracted by low cost, and sometimes poorly maintained housing. The diversity of the area creates challenges. People from different backgrounds don't necessarily know each other, get on well or treat each other with respect, creating community tensions particularly where there are differences in cultures that impact negatively on others. For example groups of families and friends gathering noisily and drinking outside when families with small children need them to be sleeping. The BD5 Faith Forum and other more informal community working by faith and community based organisations, includes organising community events, helping different people to connect in social, non-threatening ways and create positive relationships. The ward has a number of organisations that attract and utilise volunteers to help run their services, sessions and activities which helps them work with local people on local issues and priorities. Manchester Road (a busy dual carriageway) bisects the ward and is a physical barrier to community cohesion.

August / September 2017 – Ward Officer, Council Warden and local resident drafted a letter and circulated to all properties in Acre Ave and Acre Drive requesting volunteers to help out on a grass verge improvement scheme. April to September 2017 – Council Warden dealt with a range of environmental reports (litter, graffiti and fly tipping) at; Bracken Edge, Apperley Rd, New St, Westfield Ln, Greengates Recreation area, Idle Recreation area and Idle Car Park.

Funding for services at Thorpe Edge will continue until June 2018-these include EAE Walking Group, Wildlife and plant id walk, dog walking, 10+ challenge, swimming at Eccleshill pool, Tai chi, Boxercise, football training, fun with food (families and children) and primary school cooking classes

3.4 On 1st October 2017 a new fully integrated substance misuse service for Alcohol and Drug users in Bradford and Airedale commenced under the service name `New Directions`.

The service is delivered by Change, Grow, Live, a large national recovery focussed organisation who are working in partnership with Bridge and Project 6.

The service operates a dedicated single point of contact based at Pelican House, 10 Currer Street, Bradford BD1 5BA and all service users, carers, professionals or members of the public can make referrals to the service through a dedicated 24/7 contact number of 01274 296023.

Any individual who accesses interventions at the service will be allocated a dedicated recovery worker who will work with the individual at an appropriate location. New Directions has hubs located in both Bradford and Keighley and also access to 27 community locations across the district.

3.5 There is 1 outreach venue in Idle & Thackley at a GP surgery. This is currently being reviewed as not many people are accessing this location. The GP surgery is making referrals for patients but they are often choosing to access advice in other venues eg Gateway, Thorpe Edge or Eccleshill Mechanics Institute. This may be due to the surgery not being on a bus route. It is likely that the sessions at the surgery will be ended and an alternative location sought within the ward.

Family Action have indicated they are continuing to review venues in this locality and are waiting to meet with Cllr Rachel Sunderland to discuss this.

The performance data for Q2 shows 15 people from Idle & Thackley accessed services in the Bradford East locality and 21 people from Idle & Thackley accessed services outside of the locality. 6 in Windhill, , 5 Bradford CAB, 3 Shipley CAB, 2 Wrose Health Centre, and the remainder in 6 different locations. These figures do not include those accessing phone advice or other contacts.

There are 5127 privately own houses, 951 privately rented and 860 social rented properties in Idle and Thackley ward. The ward is identified through the Development Plan as a site for a large number of houses.

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May to August 2017 – Youth Worker, National Citizen Service, volunteers from Springfield Centre and Ward Officer regularly met to plan and organise 7 days of activities for young people during school holidays. Activities included drama workshops, environmental clean ups around Springfield Centre and art workshops. The aim was to develop the skills of young people aged 15 – 17 by giving them personal challenges, team challenges and real challenges to building social action.

There are 915 children living in Idle and Thackley ward aged between 12 and 18, 48% are female and 52% are male. 90% of these young people are white British. Less than half of them (545) attend Immanuel College the remainder are split between 52 other places of education. 19 young people (as of 31.10.2016) are on the role of a Pupil Referral Unit. There are 3 homes for Children in Public Care and 15 children placed in foster care and 15 children from Idle and Thackley placed in foster care elsewhere. There are 16 children subject of a Child Protection Plan and 18 children subject to Child in Need plan. There are 18 young people with a statement of SEN and 31 with an Education, Health and Care Plan. 31 Families are working with the Families First Plan and there are 12 children at risk from child sexual exploitation.

Parkland and Greenwood Primary schools and Hanson Academy are judged by OFSTED to be requiring improvement. The remainder are either good or outstanding.
