He was the first governor general for Pakistan in 1947 and also because our family is still very Patriotic and invest heavily into the Asian community both here in Bradford and surrounding areas. We do a lot of unseen work for the local charities and our family business is called Jinnah.

Therefore, we would like to use this name for the properties that we are having built as part of our legacy to Bradford where I have spent all of my years since coming to this country.

I am extremely proud of the good things that I have encouraged and supported over the years and think of this as my home.

As the naming of a new street after any individual is a sensitive matter, to be given very serious consideration, and is usually only approved in exceptional circumstances, it is sensible to provide an alternative suggestion in the event that the Committee does not approve this proposal. 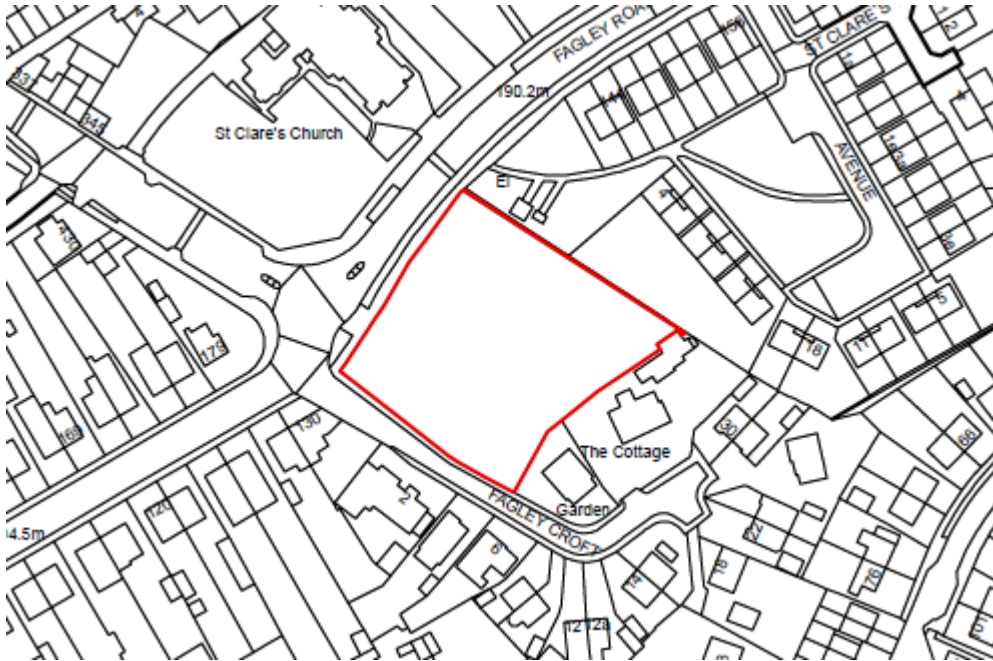

1. SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report seeks approval for a list of sites for inclusion in the Bradford East Various Sites Traffic Regulation Order 2021-22.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The West Yorkshire Transport Strategy 2040 was approved by the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA) in August 2017. In conjunction with the Strategic Economic Plan, the overarching aim of the strategy is “...for Leeds City Region to be a globally recognised economy where good growth delivers high levels of prosperity, jobs and quality of life for everyone.”

- 2.2 The key objectives of the strategy are:

Economy: Create a more reliable, less congested, better connected transport network.

Environment: Have a positive impact on our built and natural environment.

People and place: Put people first to create a strong sense of place.

- 2.3 In terms of Safer Roads themes, the strategy includes a specific aim to reduce road accidents, aspiring to ‘zero tolerance’ of transport-related deaths. There are also aspirations to encourage walking and cycling by improving safety.
- 2.4 An element of the Safer Roads budget can also be prioritised to address community safety, access, mobility and sustainable transport issues. The determination of proposed schemes programmes takes into account the needs of all road users, including those with special mobility needs.
- 2.5 Due to the timing of funding announcements, previous years Safer Roads programmes have generally been presented to Area Committees in June or July. This has sometimes resulted in there being only 8 months to deliver a full programme of schemes; given the lengthy consultation and legal process required for many of the projects, this has inevitably resulted in a failure to complete programmes on time. In order to ensure timely delivery of schemes, it was decided that from 2020 onwards, 2-year programmes would be set. This also facilitates the potential for a more flexible approach whereby more significant schemes could be funded over a 2-year period.
- 2.6 At the meeting on 19 February 2020, the Bradford East Area Committee set a 2-year Safer Roads programme for the 2020/21 and 2021/22 financial years. However, whilst the allocation for the 2021/22 Bradford East Various Sites Traffic Regulation Order was set, it was recommended that the prioritisation of specific sites be determined at a later date (to enable consideration of an emerging issues).
- 2.7 A list of sites recommended for inclusion in the 2021/22 Bradford East Various Sites Traffic Regulation Order is attached as Appendix 1. A full list of all outstanding requests for minor Traffic Regulation Orders is attached as Appendix 2.

3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1 The process of promoting a constituency-wide Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) ensures that a significant number of requests for such Orders can be addressed on an annual basis (in comparison to the historical arrangement of promoting a series of individual Orders. However, to ensure that budget and time constraints are met it would not be feasible to include any larger schemes or Residents Permit Parking Schemes within the constituency-wide Order. (Due to the more extensive processes involved).

4. FINANCIAL & RESOURCE APPRAISAL

- 4.1 The allocation for the 2021/22 Bradford East Various Sites Traffic Regulation Order, as approved by the Bradford East Area Committee on 19 February 2020, is £13,000. The recommended Order detailed in Appendix 1 could be delivered within that budget.

5. RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES

- 5.1 There are no significant risks arising out of the implementation of the proposed recommendations.

- 6.1 There are no specific issues arising from this report. The course of action proposed is in accordance with the Council's powers as Highway Authority and Traffic Regulation Authority.
- 6.2 The promoted Order will be an amendment Order to the Council's Consolidation Order (2015) (as amended).

1. SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report seeks to update members on current casualty levels and trends in the Bradford District and on the Road Safety Education, Training and Publicity initiatives aimed at reducing these casualties.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 A report on proposals for the devolution of Road Safety funding was considered by the Area Committees in 2012. Members resolved to support an evidence based approach to determine Road Safety priorities. It was also resolved to present an annual 'State of the Nation' style report detailing casualty numbers/trends and details of ongoing and proposed road safety education, training and publicity initiatives to the Area Committees.
- 2.2 The West Yorkshire Transport Strategy 2040 includes a specific aim to reduce road accidents, aspiring to 'zero tolerance' of transport-related deaths. Adoption of 'Vision Zero' has been accepted by the West Yorkshire Safer Roads Executive and we are in the process of developing the reality of this vision for the districts. There are also aspirations to encourage walking and cycling by improving safety. The strategy includes a casualty reduction target, similar to that first introduced within the Local Transport Plan. This equates to a 42% reduction in the number of people killed or seriously injured in road collisions (KSI) by 2027. (Using the 2016 KSI figure as a base).
- 2.3 A 'Road Casualties' report is published annually. Based on Police Road Traffic Collision records the report identifies casualty reduction priorities for the District. This report takes into account the most recent full year data available, i.e. currently 2020, and trends in comparison to preceding years.
- 2.4 Given the relatively small data set for user and demographic groups for individual constituencies, district wide casualty data is more generally used to inform some intervention priorities.
- 2.5 In 2020 there was an overall decrease in casualties in the Bradford District, down from 1,117 in 2019, to 937 in 2020. This continues the well-established long term trend which is also mirrored at West Yorkshire level. When taking different road user groups into consideration, car occupant casualties reduced from 688 to 570 and pedestrian casualties reduced from 244 to 192. There were however casualty increases for two road user groups; cyclists, where casualties increased from 80- 89, and motorcyclists where casualties increased from 45 to 62. Both issues have been brought to the attention of the West Yorkshire Safer Roads Executive and will be examined in detail and reported back to this committee. The global Covid-19 pandemic and associated lockdowns had a significant impact on road traffic volumes and it is therefore difficult to establish how much of the downward trend seen in 2020 is due to an overall reduction in road traffic and how much is continuing the well-established downward trend from previous years. Appendix 1 shows the present position for the Bradford District.
- 2.6 Public Health (PH) now provides financial support for the Road Safety Team. An Inter Departmental Agreement has been agreed linking the Road Safety Team

programme with PH outcomes which include; killed and serious injuries, hospital admissions caused by unintentional injury, infant mortality and mortality rate from causes considered preventable.

- 2.7 The Road Safety Team operates on a district-wide basis. Casualty data is used to identify priorities and staff and financial resources are allocated to education, training and publicity programmes accordingly. Delivery programmes are highlighted in the Bradford Metropolitan District Road Safety Plan which is supported by the Area Committees.
- 2.8 Car occupants continue to account for the highest number of casualties in the district and are targeted through a range of publicity campaigns and enforcement. The team also try to improve safety for other road user groups (e.g. pedestrians, cyclists and motorcyclists) by targeting messages at motorists and reminding them to drive carefully and look out for these more vulnerable groups. This work is becoming increasingly important as the council tries to encourage people to switch to more active and sustainable modes of travel.
- 2.9 Education and training initiatives, delivered at local level, target the 0-19 age group through work with schools, other educational establishments, youth organisations, multi-agency partnerships and Area Coordinator teams. Road safety presentations and delivery focus on core road safety messages, covering pedestrian safety, in car safety and cycle safety. For older pupils in secondary schools, presentations also cover the consequences and impacts of poor road safety choices, peer pressure and driver & passenger safety.
- 2.10 The West Yorkshire Safer Roads Delivery Group, which comprises of Road Safety Officers from each district, the police and Fire and Rescue, delivers regional road safety campaigns, often focusing on outdoor and radio advertising. Interventions are data led and add weight and value to road safety work undertaken at local district level.

3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Engagement with Schools

- 3.1 Ordinarily, the team provides a three tier district wide service. The first tier is where schools in the eight wards with the highest child casualties are targeted. The second tier is the delivery of presentations by the team which are booked on a first come first served basis. The third tier is the provision of resources and information for all schools which does not need a road safety officer to deliver.
- 3.2 In 2020, the Global Covid-19 pandemic, associated lockdowns and school closures severely impacted the team's ability to engage with schools. Delivery of the usual suite of interventions such as practical training and classroom based education was simply not possible. As such, for the greater part of the year, the team focused on developing and providing digital resources to schools. These included PowerPoint presentations, online teaching resources and road safety activities. Where possible the team also distributed physical leaflets and booklets to pupils and parents/ carers. Appendix 2 provides more information on work undertaken during 2020.

- 3.3 With restrictions easing during the Autumn of 2020 (before further lockdowns in November and January) and with schools reopening in March 2021, the Road Safety Team have been able to deliver some practical outdoor training to Primary Schools during the academic year Sept 2020-July 2021. This has comprised of outdoor Pedestrian Training & Bikeability. Indoor delivery of road safety sessions has not been possible under existing risk assessment protocols, although the team are hoping that this will resume in September 2021. For secondary schools, sessions have largely been delivered via virtual platforms such as MS Teams or Zoom although TTC, a company who are piloting a young driver workshop on behalf of Bradford Council, have been able to deliver some face to face sessions due to small group numbers per session. Appendix 3 shows school engagement by ward for the academic year August 2020- July 2021.
- 3.4 Going forward, the team will continue to address road safety issues identified in the annual 'Road Casualties' reports and analyse emerging trends and patterns. The work of the team will also support wider council objectives aimed at reducing health inequalities, encouraging active and sustainable travel and around air quality, pollution and climate change.

Safer Roads schemes

- 3.5 The Traffic & Highways Area Teams deliver a programme of Safer Roads engineering measures such as traffic calming, pedestrian and cycle facilities, speed limit reductions and parking management. These schemes are funded through the Local Transport Plan and are largely evidence-based to ensure best value in terms of casualty reduction. The Safer Roads schemes programmes are the subject of separate reports to the Area Committees.
- 3.6 The Council has a devolved Highways budget to deal with larger scale safety priorities that are beyond the scope of an individual Area Committee. As such, programmes around School 20mph zones, city/town centre 20pmh zones and school streets have been delivered and will continue to be delivered.

4. FINANCIAL & RESOURCE APPRAISAL

- 4.1 There is a base budget allocation for education, training and publicity staffing from Public Health. Financial support from a devolved Integrated Transport Block fund to the Council's Executive is in place for the 21/22 Financial year.

5. RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES

- 5.1 Budget spend on Road Safety is currently prioritised against overall district casualty prevention & road safety priorities which are, in turn, determined by analysis of statistical data relating to road casualties. This analysis, underpinned by the District Road Safety Plan priorities, is used to establish key themes and target groups / cohorts. It is anticipated that a failure to maintain this approach would have a detrimental effect on future casualty prevention and ambitions to remove barriers to more active and sustainable travel.
- 5.2 Without continued strategic use of resources the ability of the Council to achieve value for money through procurement savings as well as participating in

partnership working on West Yorkshire and Yorkshire and Humber campaigns, initiatives and events would be at risk.

6. LEGAL APPRAISAL

- 6.1 The ongoing activities of the Road Safety team contribute to the Council's duties under the Road Traffic Act 1988.

7. OTHER IMPLICATIONS

7.1 SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

The provision of road safety education, training and publicity supports a shift to more sustainable and active transport modes.

7.2 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS IMPACTS

Any increases in walking, cycling or public transport use encouraged by the delivery of road safety education, training and publicity would have a positive impact on reducing Greenhouse Gas emissions and improving air quality.

7.3 COMMUNITY SAFETY IMPLICATIONS

The work of the Road Safety team contributes towards improving community safety in the following areas:

- Drivers and passengers – speed, seatbelt wearing, mobile phone use
- Tackling anti-social driving behaviour – which often acts as a barrier to more active and sustainable travel and reduces community cohesion
- Pedestrian & cycle safety
- Vulnerable road users: children, pedestrians, cyclists and motorcyclists
- Safety around school
- Removing barriers to more active and sustainable travel

APPENDIX 2 - SUMMARY OF ACTIVITY DURING 2020

The outbreak of the global Covid-19 pandemic, associated lockdowns and school closures had a significant impact on the team's ability to deliver the pre-planned and agreed road safety programme for the 12 months between March 2020 to March 2021.

At the start of the first lockdown in March 2020, it was hoped that school closures and restrictions would be a relatively short term measure and that some sort of return to normality would be possible before the end of the academic year. Existing bookings were therefore paused with a view to rescheduling them later in the school year. As it became clear that the impact of COVID would be felt over the longer term, the team quickly began work on the development of a suite of digital resources and presentations which could be sent to schools in lieu of direct/ face to face delivery along with the distribution of physical leaflets, booklets and other resources where possible.

The table below summarises some of the interventions that were adapted or developed in order to provide some element of road safety education during 2020.

1. SUMMARY

This report informs the Area Committee of the grants awarded to projects within the Bradford East Area by the Area Co-ordinator's Office in the financial years 2019/20 and 2020/21.

2. BACKGROUND

2.1 This report gives details of four grant schemes that were administered by Bradford East Area Co-ordinator's Office during the financial years 2019/20 and 2020/21. These schemes were designed to support a wide range of projects and activities within the Bradford East Area. Applications for grants were considered from groups and organisations working for the benefit of people living in the Bradford East Area.

2.2 Information on the grant schemes, and how to apply, was available on the Bradford Council website and sent out by the Area Co-ordinator's Office to its well-established network of community groups and organisations. Appendix A

Community Chest Grants 2019/20

CRITERIA FOR APPLICATIONS

Applications will only be considered from groups/organisations that either operate in, or benefit people who live in the Bradford East Constituency area.

Applications will be considered to assist community based activities which will be of benefit to the community, and where the activity could not go ahead without financial assistance. Special consideration will be given to projects that target issues of deprivation and disadvantage.

Examples of what will be funded:	Examples of what won't be funded:

The organisation should be a non-profit making voluntary organisation where membership is open (i.e. no discrimination of membership on grounds of sex, race religion, occupation or opinion).

The maximum allocation from the Community Chest will not exceed £500.00 for any individual project. Projects which cross boundaries can be considered by a number of Area Committees, but the total grant will not exceed £500.00.

Groups which have applied for and received funding in previous years will not be funded for the same or repeated project.

Groups/organisations should normally expect only one grant per financial year.

Bradford East Area Committee expects organisations to make every effort to be self-supporting, and will favour grants where other funding/fundraising has been secured.

Projects should demonstrate that appropriate child and adult protection policies are in place together with any necessary Health and Safety arrangements.

Projects should not contravene Council Policy Guidelines in areas of equality of opportunity (i.e. no discrimination of membership on grounds of sex, race, religion, occupation or opinion).

Appendix C

Cleaner Streets Fund Grants 2020/21

About the funding

1. The Cleaner Streets Fund has been made possible by Bradford Council and Bradford Councillors commitment to help extend the 'People Can' campaign, supporting volunteer and community-led action / ideas that help make a difference to our district's environment, neighbourhoods and places of community interest.
2. Keeping Bradford district clean is a top priority for the Council, our partners and communities. Cleaner streets enhance community pride and make areas much more attractive places to live, visit and do business.
3. A total of £250,000 has been made available to apply for as grants for community-led activities with £50,000 allocated to each area constituency Bradford East, Bradford West, Bradford South, Shipley and Keighley for the period April 2020 / March 2021.
4. Between 2019 / 2020 the Council have supported more than 200 environmental initiatives including community-led litter picks across the district thanks to the efforts of 6,000+ volunteers.
5. The Cleaner Streets Fund supports to extend the People Can movement in Bradford through positive environmental social action empowering communities to help improve local areas and local priorities. It's a chance for communities to get together and put forward community-led ideas and projects that will help make our streets and areas cleaner. It's a chance to get even more people engaged with helping to make a positive difference in their local areas.

Aims of the fund

The funding has six key aims:

1. To help make our neighbourhoods, towns and village centres look their best.
2. To support community involvement and volunteering in environmental improvements by testing new community-led ideas and approaches.
3. To help build on existing positive social action and / or create new networks, projects and activities which encourage positive social action.
4. To help support self-sustaining groups and sustainable ways of bringing positive environmental improvements e.g. helping to encourage volunteers to adopt streets, become street champions etc.
5. To help develop local campaigns to encourage more reporting of people littering and fly-tipping to support increasing issuing litter fines and prosecutions.
6. To help raise awareness of the impact and consequences of environmental crime and anti-social behaviour.

How much is available?

- Grants of up to £2000 are available and we anticipate that many grants will be much less than this. This will be restricted to a maximum of £2,000 per organisation across the district.
- We particularly welcome applications for smaller project costs.
- Groups can apply for funding to support their own activity.
- We will be aiming to ensure that funding is spread around the district's wards and will ask that groups feedback on the difference it has made.
- Bradford Council's Ward Officers will encourage groups to apply from across all wards to this fund.
- Groups are encouraged to provide match funding where this is possible.

Who can apply?

- We welcome applications from, or supported by constituted voluntary groups and organisations, places of worship, Friends of Groups, charities, parish and town councils.
- We are keen to support the development of new groups and new ideas. You therefore do not need to be a registered charity or established group to apply.
- We are particularly keen to support areas where there has historically been less community involvement in keeping the local area clean and tidy and will be looking at other ways we can support this.
- We recognise that community activity is often on an informal basis and aim to be flexible to accommodate that while putting appropriate safeguards in place. We may request references.

Where can it be spent?

- The funding is available is open district wide to all Wards and will be administered through the Council's Area Co-ordinator's Offices.
- Funding must be spent within 12 months of the date of the grant award being made.

What can it be spent on?

- The grant funding can be used to cover a range of costs as long as they are in line with the aims of the fund set out above. For example:
- Buying tools such as litter pickers and high visibility vests for community tidy ups
- Cleaning up graffiti
- Buying plants, paint and brushes or other equipment to smarten up an area
- Signage or training
- Publicity material, venue or refreshment costs for community events
- Designing out environmental crime in littered areas and local 'grot' spots.
- Funding cannot be used to pay for staff costs or to pay people for their time.

Applications will be considered by the Bradford East Area Grants Advisory Group in partnership with the Area Co-ordinators Office. We will inform applicants about the outcome of their application as soon as possible.

- Political campaigning.

- **Grants of up to £1,000**

Eligibility Criteria

The *Innovation Fund* is open to applications from a wide range of organisations. We are willing to support proposals that meet the following eligibility criteria:

- Organisations must be legally constituted, although groups that are not formally constituted should request for a lead organisation to be the accountable body. Bradford Council, individuals, sole traders and limited liability partnerships are not eligible
- Organisations must have a registered bank account in the name of the organisation, and they must be able to demonstrate fair and transparent governance arrangements including an Equal Opportunities policy
- Organisations working with children or vulnerable adults will need to demonstrate appropriate safeguarding policies
- An organisation can only be the lead partner on one bid per funding round
- A group or organisation can only apply once per round.

Evaluation and Monitoring

We are committed to ensuring that projects supported through the grant measure the positive outcomes they achieve.

Applicants will be expected to help us think about how the success of the project might be measured from the start. Applicants must be willing to share additional unidentifiable information as required by the programme and collect data before and at the end of the project and share this data with Bradford Council. Applicants must ensure they comply with data protection regulations.

What we learn from the grant will be disseminated widely.
