## **1. Summary**

- 1.1 This report outlines the allocation of the Community Chest Budget for the financial year 2022/2023 and asks Members to consider the make-up of the Grants Advisory Group in the Bradford East Area for 2023/2024. The Queen's Jubilee and the King's Coronation funding allocations are also highlighted.

## **2. Background**

- 2.1 The Community Chest Budget assists and enables a wide range of community initiatives to be developed for the benefit of communities in the Bradford East Area.
- 2.2 The Community Chest Budget allocated to the Bradford East Area Coordinator's Office for 2022/2023 was £11,500 and the same amount is available for 2023/2024.
- 2.3 Applications that meet the published criteria are considered from community groups and organisations and sometimes from individuals living and benefiting the Bradford East Area.
- 2.4 The Area Co-ordinator, or designated officer, is responsible for making the decisions on the Community Chest applications received. These decisions are made in consultation with the Grants Advisory Group whose membership is made up of three Elected Members, reflecting the political make up of the Bradford East Area Committee. In previous years the Chair, Deputy Chair and the Opposition Spokesperson have made up the Grants Advisory Group.
- 2.5 Interest in and the demand on the Community Chest Fund continues to be extremely high. Over the years, the Community Chest Fund has been well used by local community and voluntary organisations and individuals. Numerous activities and events have been supported which otherwise may have been difficult to run. Organisations and activities funded in 2022/2023 in Bradford East are shown in appendix A.
- 2.6 Funding was also made available for events and activities to support the Queen's Jubilee and the King's Coronation. The grants awarded are listed in appendices B and C.

## **3. Other considerations**

- 3.1 During the financial year 2022/2023, 30 applications for Community Chest Grants were awarded to community groups, a breakdown of these is shown in appendix A.
- 3.2 In reviewing the Community Chest grant allocation for 2022/2023, it is important to note the high demand on the fund available to Bradford East Area Co-ordinator's Office. Owing to the high demand on the limited Community Chest fund it has been a practice of the Bradford East Area Co-ordinator, or designated officer, in consultation with the Grants Advisory Group, to contribute towards the total cost of the activity and to only occasionally approve the full amount requested.

5.1.1 In 2022/2023 the Community Chest funding allocated was £11,500.

5.1.2 The 2023/2024 Community Chest Fund is £11,500. The Fund is frequently match funded by contributions from other Council Departments, external funders and fundraising by the local community groups applying.

5.2.1 Officer support is provided from the Area Co-ordinator's Office from within existing resources.

2.1 The subway on Wakefield Road near the junction with Rhine Street has a high ongoing maintenance cost due to constant vandalism, drainage issues, damage to the internal lights, graffiti and frequent cost of accident damage repairs to the walls adjacent to the main carriageway. Therefore, it is proposed to close and backfill the existing subway and introduce a new surface-level staggered Puffin Crossing alongside a signal controlled Cycle Crossing at the same location as the subway on Wakefield Road. The crossing will also include mast arm signal posts on both sides of the main carriageway and landscaping works on the existing footprint of the subway ramps and stairs.

2.2 A similar project, albeit on a larger scale, was successfully undertaken recently at the roundabout further outbound on Wakefield Road (Neville Road junction).

2.3 The location of the proposed measures is shown on drawing nos. HS/TRSS/105524/CON-1A, attached as Appendix 1.

2.4 The proposals were advertised between 18<sup>th</sup> May 2023 to 16<sup>th</sup> June 2023. This resulted in two objections and an email of support with further aspirational improvement suggestions for works on Wakefield Road.

2.5 A summary of the objections/representations and corresponding officer comments is tabulated below:

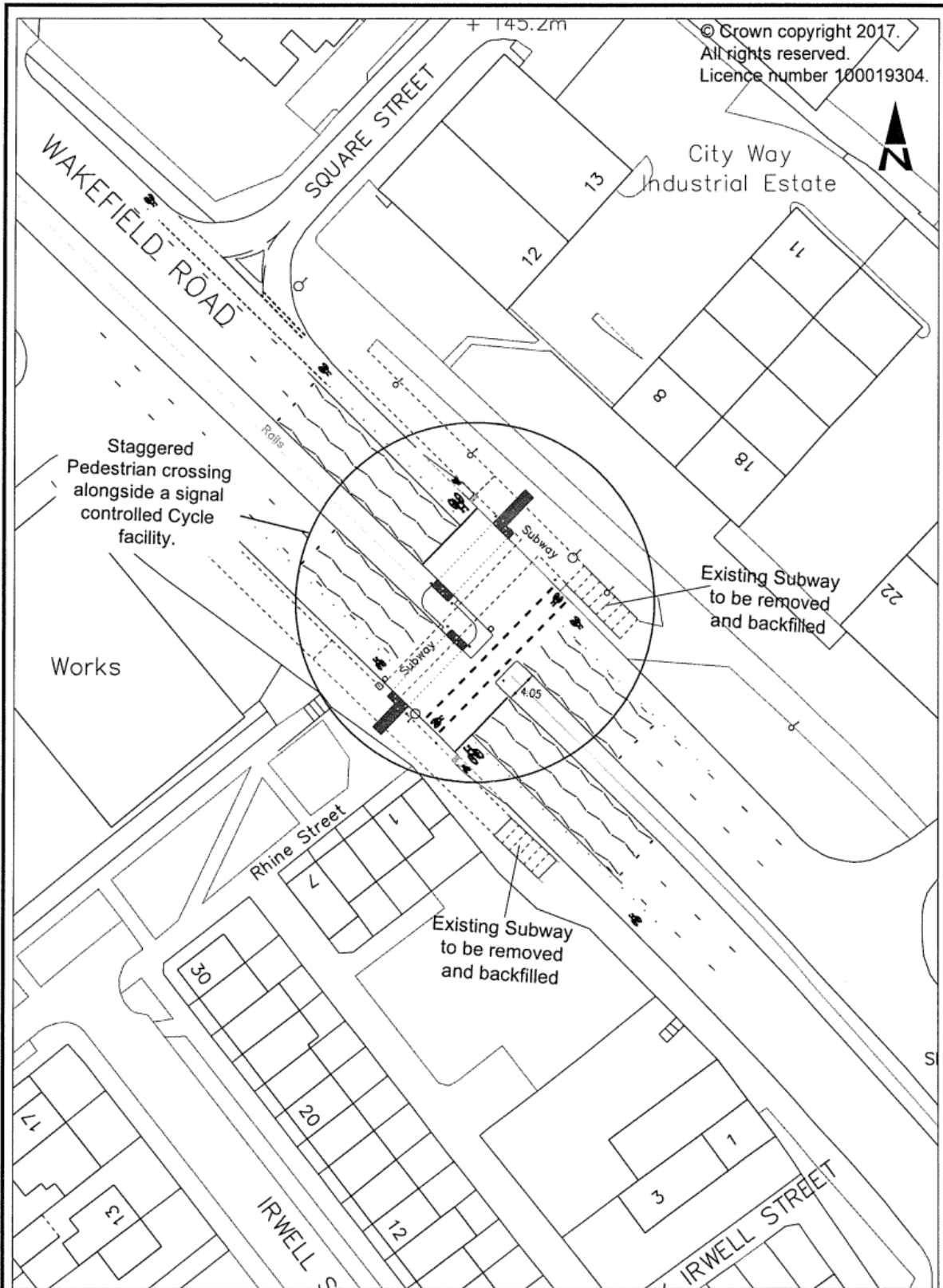

**1.0 SUMMARY**

1.1 This report considers objections received to the previously advertised Bradford East Area-Wide Traffic Regulation Order.

**2.0 BACKGROUND**

2.1 At the meeting on 5 July 2022 the Bradford East Area Committee approved, as part of its Safe Roads schemes programme, the advertisement of an area-wide Traffic Regulation Order for 14 sites at various locations in the Bradford East constituency.

2.2 The Order has been promoted to address a number of requests for small areas of existing waiting restrictions to be amended or new parking restrictions to be introduced. The requests have been raised by local residents and businesses to resolve safety and access issues.

2.3 The Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) was advertised between 26 January 2023 and 17 February 2023. At the same time consultation letters and plans were delivered to residents and businesses directly affected by the proposals. This has resulted in objections to the proposals at 2 sites both situated on Moorside Road –Eccleshill. Plans of the proposals that have received objections are attached as Appendices 1 and 2.

2.4 A summary of the valid points of objection and corresponding officer comments is tabulated below:

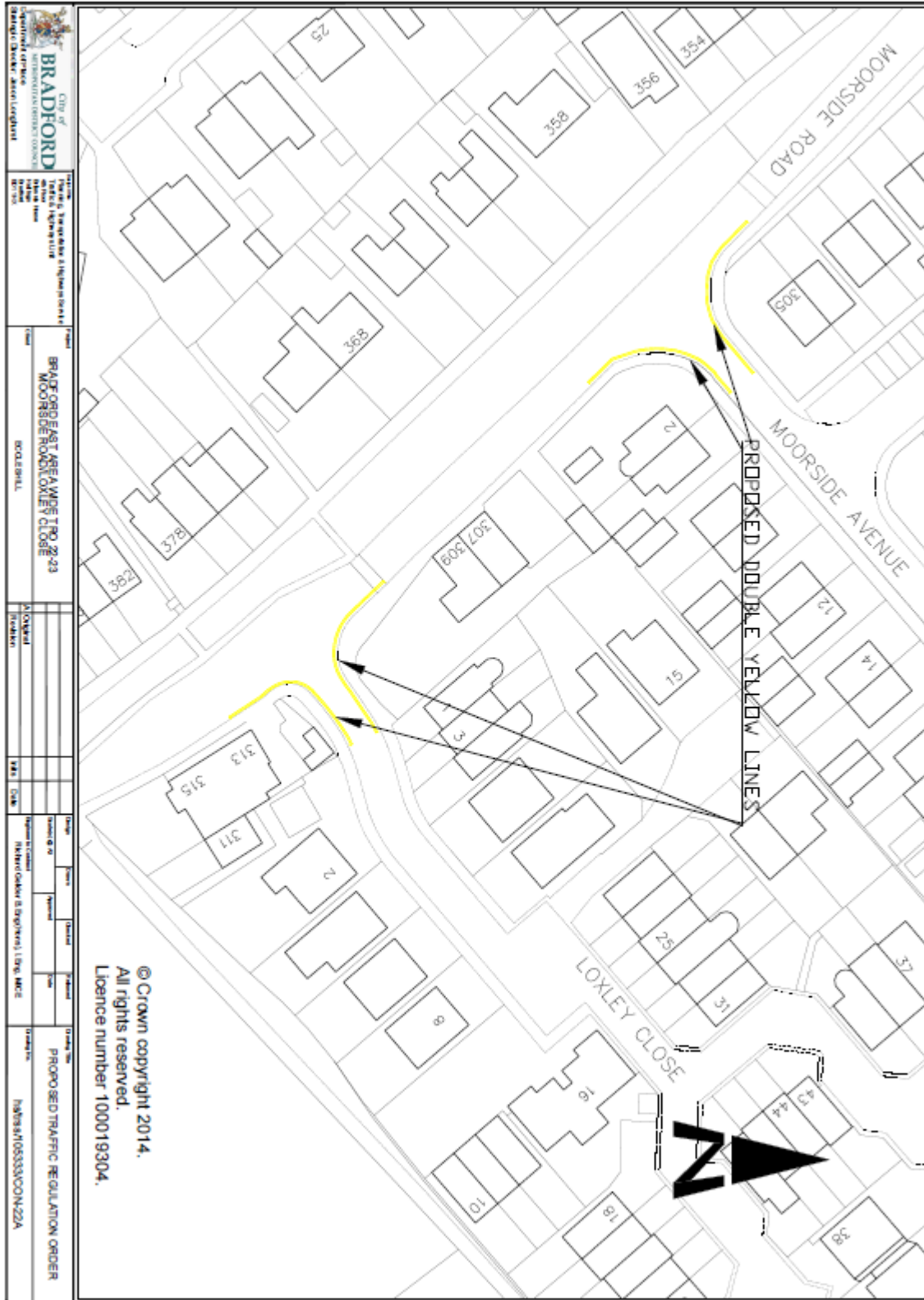

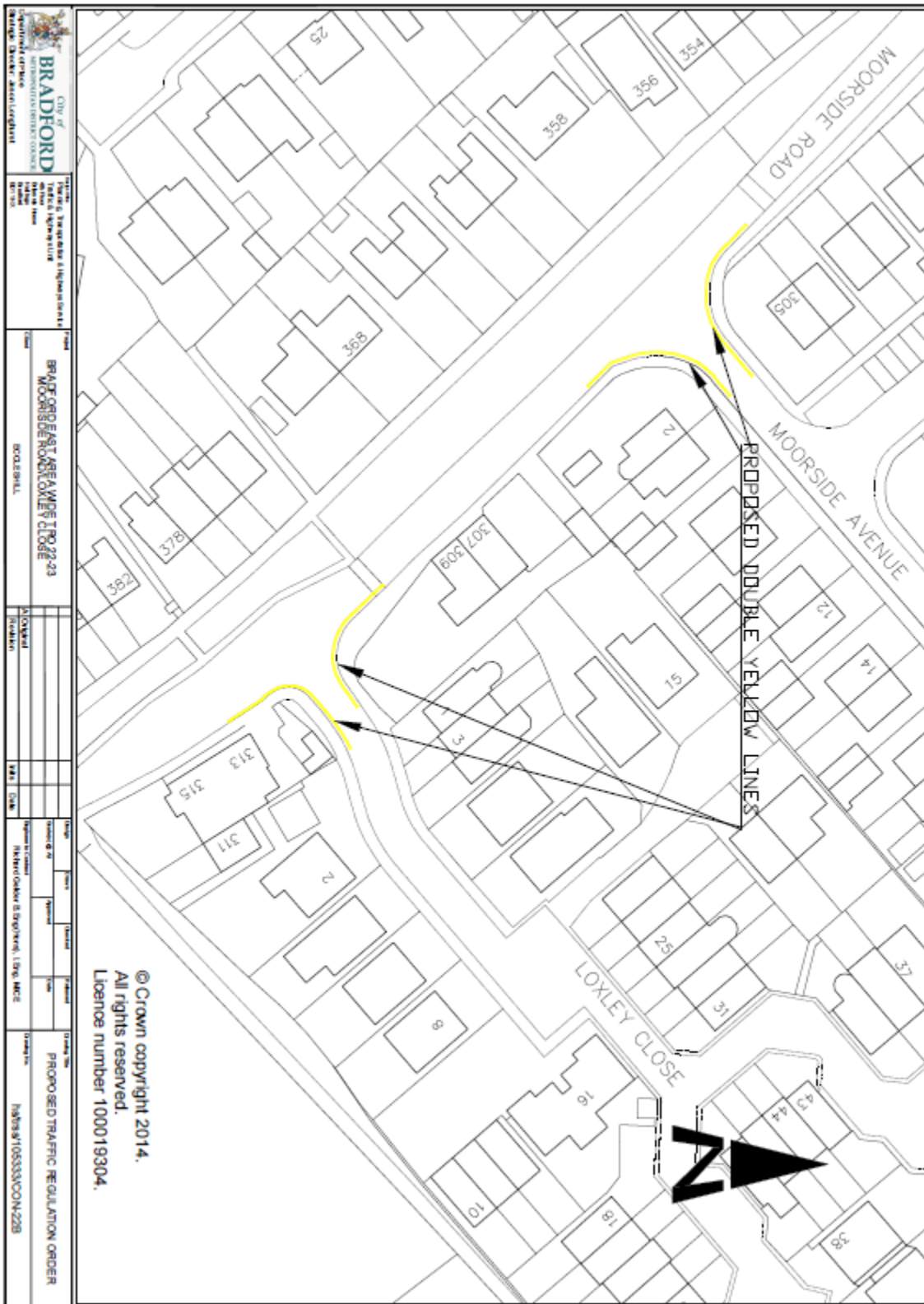

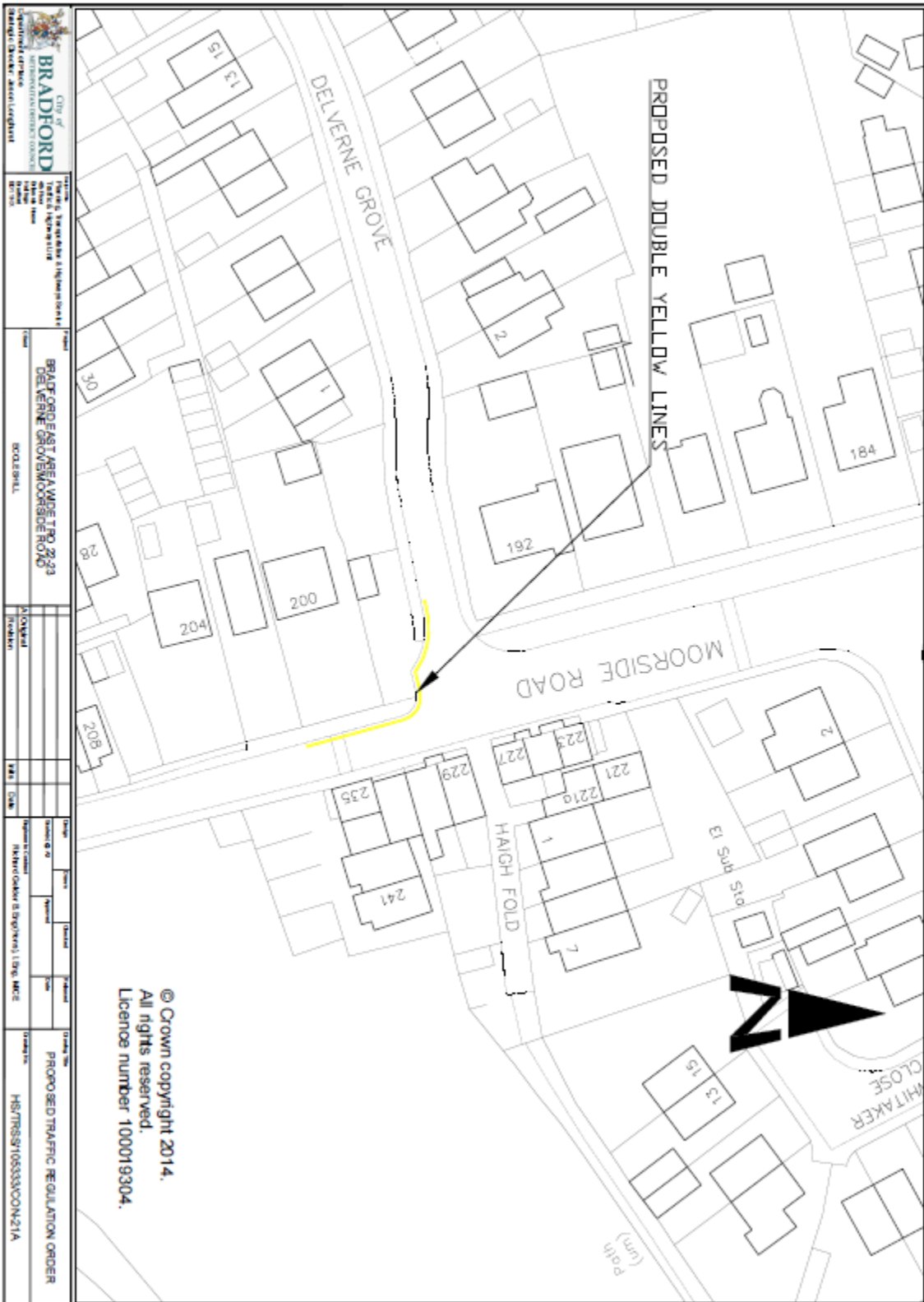

## 1.0 SUMMARY

- 1.1. This report considers seek approval for the 2023/24 Safe Roads programme for the Bradford East Constituency.

## 2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1. The West Yorkshire Transport Strategy 2040 was approved by the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA) in August 2017. In conjunction with the Strategic Economic Plan, the overarching aim of the strategy is “...for Leeds City Region to be a globally recognised economy where good growth delivers high levels of prosperity, jobs and quality of life for everyone
- 2.2. The key objectives of the strategy are:
  - Economy:** Create a more reliable, less congested, better connected transport network.
  - Environment:** Have a positive impact on our built and natural environment.
  - People and place:** Put people first to create a strong sense of place.
- 2.3. In terms of the Safe Roads element of the Strategy, it states ‘We will work through our Safe Roads Partnership to deliver evidence-led highway design and road safety interventions to improve safety on the highway network, and to fund education, training and publicity programmes to improve road user behaviour and reduce casualty numbers, aspiring to ‘zero tolerance’ of transport-related deaths.
- 2.4. Following completion of the last Local Transport Plan Implementation plan programme funding for Safe Roads projects from the 2022/23 financial year onwards is now provided via the (Leeds) City Region Sustainable Transport Settlement (CRSTS).

## 3.0 OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1. It is recommended that the Area Committee re-affirms its commitment to progressing Disabled Persons Parking Places and undertaking mobility access improvement works by again including budgets for these within the 2023/24 programme. The cost of any traffic surveys required to assess requests for traffic management measures and assist in determining future schemes programmes will also need to be met from this budget as these are now generally externally procured to maximise resources
- 3.2. It is also suggested that the successful exercise of promoting a constituency-wide Traffic Regulation Order (TRO), to include a number of sites where minor amendments to waiting restrictions have been requested, be repeated in 2023/24. (Due to the more extensive processes involved, it would not be feasible to include any larger schemes or Residents Permit Parking Schemes within the constituency-wide Order).

#### **4.0 FINANCIAL & RESOURCE APPRAISAL**

- 4.1. A budget of £110,000 is available for 2023/24. Suggested schemes programmes are detailed in Appendices 1 and 2.

#### **5.0 RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES**

- 5.1. In line with other sectors of the UK economy construction price inflation is now running at significantly higher rates than previously. Inflationary pressure has seen suppliers, and in turn contractors, being unable to sustain previously quoted prices or maintain price certainty for protracted periods as materials costs fluctuate to reflect demand in the market. Consequently, there is a significant risk to the full delivery of the projects in the 2023/24 programme should inflationary pressures continue their upward trajectory. Whilst every effort has been taken to account for such pressures in developing this years' programme there remains a possibility that costs will rise more significantly than anticipated meaning that not all projects approved will be deliverable from the 2023/24 funding allocation.
- 5.2. CRSTS funding has a new oversight and governance arrangement implemented by WYCA to meet the requirements of central government.

#### **6.0 LEGAL APPRAISAL**

- 6.1. There are no specific issues arising from this report. The course of action proposed is in accordance with the Council's power as Highway Authority.

#### **7.0 OTHER IMPLICATIONS**

The proposed projects seek to promote walking and cycling activities either by the provision of specific facilities or the creation of safer environments.

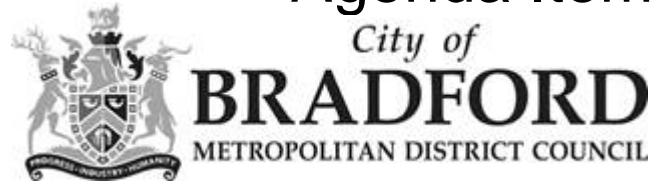

## 1. SUMMARY

The Council, working with partner agencies, is undertaking work to strengthen its approach to Locality Working. A key part of that approach is the development of Locality Plans. This report presents an update on the delivery of the Bradford East Locality Plan 2022-25 including the six Ward Plans.

## 2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Further to the presentation of the Bradford East Locality Plan 2022 – 2025 to the Bradford East Area Committee on 28 September 2022, the Area Team has been working with a range of stakeholders to deliver on the priorities in the Plan. The updates are highlighted in Appendices A and B. Strengthening relationships with partners and deepening their understanding of community strengths and needs has been a critical part of the early stages of the development of the Plan. By building mutual trust and respect, staff in the Area Team have been able to support partners to extend their reach to new arrivals and reach deeper into communities of interest and neighbourhoods.
- 2.2 There is increasing recognition of the need to deliver at the lowest level of subsidiarity by supporting organisations to ensure that the right offer is delivered in the right place at the right time. There are numerous examples of where this has worked over the last 9 months. Bringing health checks into community settings, including faith centres, has resulted in significant demand and opportunities for discussion to encourage self-care, and referrals to services at an early stage. Dozens of bespoke courses have been developed and delivered at local centres, faith-based organisations and schools based on consultations with residents, along with volunteer days, job fairs and volunteering opportunities to support people into training and the labour market. Officers, such as job coaches, are working from a range of community settings to develop relationships with voluntary and community sector organisations and to be there first hand to support individuals.
- 2.3 Community-based events, run with the community and other partners, have been key in bringing people together, to celebrate and have fun and to engage with people who do not benefit from other support networks. These have been part of the local offer focussed on a place or a community of interest such as events as part of the recent Refugee Week, women’s events at Laisterdyke Hub, Seymour Park Fun Days, ‘Spring into Summer’ at Peel Park and the Children’s Literacy Festival. These are often pathways into other support and a way of introducing people to volunteering.
- 2.4 Engagement with and developing the community capacity of communities of interest underpins many of the priorities in the Plan and has led to the development of groups such as the Gambian Ladies, work with men around health and wellbeing, the ‘Girls Can’ sports project, EU/Roma library and cinema nights, the Refugee Resettlement Project and Peel Park Youth-led Foodbank.
- 2.5 The benefits of working with individuals and families, using an early help and intervention approach, are evidenced through projects such as ‘Think Forward’ and ‘Neighbourhood Connect’. The former involves working with Hanson Delta Academy and other partners to support families, adopting a team around the family



approach, to encourage children and young people to improve their school attendance. Neighbourhood Connect is a recently introduced model that takes referrals from Adult Services and other organisations to help maintain people's independence by meeting their needs in their local community. Officers from the East Team find out about the person's interests and link them to local organisations, offering practical support where required. This has also resulted in Ward Officers supporting organisations such as St Vincent's Community Centre and Upper Bolton Social Club to extend their reach.

- 2.6 Where gaps in provision are identified, officers in the Area Team work with partners to develop activities or projects. The need for more positive role models for young people was identified as a priority in many wards. Different pilots will be run in wards, including work with the Media Museum, University of Bradford and networks of mentors. Work is also taking place to reduce hostility to blue light services by building understanding and relationships and trying to encourage people from different ethnic and social backgrounds into careers in these services.
- 2.7 In terms of the themes in the Plan, 'sustainability' is embedded into all the work that is undertaken but there is also an emphasis on biodiversity, growing your own and active travel. The Area Team is working with Bradford College to improve the Burnsall Road allotments in BD3, a skills academy is being developed with ROC for people interested in horticulture and volunteers and partners involved in the BD5 in Bloom Project are improving overgrown spaces for community benefit and encouraging residents to beautify their gardens running workshops to share skills. A community repair project is being explored in BD10.
- 2.8 Areas for further development include work with the private sector. Following a successful day as part of the BD5 in Bloom Project with volunteers from British Gas working with the local community to tidy up the area and produce planters, the volunteers referred to the team building benefits and the feel-good factor and expressed their interest in carrying out further similar work. The Area Team also needs to work with partners to ensure that more support for existing community hubs is provided so that workers and volunteers have access to information and support to assist residents.
- 2.9 Co-location is a developing theme with officers from Skills House and Living Well based at Laisterdyke Hub alongside voluntary and community sector organisations and the East Area Team. It is proposed to explore further opportunities to for co-location.
- 2.10 Councillors, in their roles as community leaders and place shapers, have been helping to drive many of the activities and projects and have ensured stakeholder engagement, particularly from local residents and businesses.

### **3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

There are no other considerations.

### **4. FINANCIAL & RESOURCE APPRAISAL**

This work falls within the current budget and resources of the Neighbourhood Service and other Council resources that are available for the Strengthening Locality Working programme.

The Locality and Ward Plans priorities assist the Area Committee in its place-based area management role, and to inform the allocation of Area Committee budgets.

Officer support for co-ordination to take forward the Locality and Ward Plans will be provided by the Bradford East Area Co-ordinator's Office.

The Bradford East Locality and Ward Plans 2022 – 2025 are used to inform the budget-setting processes and service-planning throughout the authority and partners.

The Bradford East Locality and Ward Plans 2022 – 2025 have been developed with and will be shared with key service-providers such as the Police, Health, social housing landlords and community organisations to request that these Plans be used to inform their own priority-setting processes.

## **5. RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES**

A key purpose of Strengthening Locality Working is to reduce the demand on services.

## **6. LEGAL APPRAISAL**

There are no known legal implications from this work.

## **7. OTHER IMPLICATIONS**
