#### 1. SUMMARY

This report provides Members with an update on progress of the Smart Street Lighting project, specifically, the work completed in the Keighley constituency replacing old street lighting luminaires, life expired columns and the installation of the Central Management system and LoRaWAN network.

#### 2. BACKGROUND

- The Council approved an invest to save project of £45m to update its current lighting stock, of approximately 56,500 assets, with the aim of significantly reducing energy consumption, maintenance costs and reducing CO<sup>2</sup> emissions. The project will replace the existing inefficient lighting with energy efficient LED's whilst retaining most of the existing lighting columns. It is envisaged that there will be a need for the replacement of approximately 15,600 life expired lighting columns which were identified during a survey of all existing assets (carried out in 2019-20). The new lighting solution will be controlled using a Central Management System (CMS) to control the lighting via a Low power wide area network (LoRaWAN) platform to facilitate Internet of Things (IoT) connectivity for a variety of sensors and devices.
- The project has been split into two work streams "In Scope" works around 48,300 assets which are the standard column replacements, connections and luminaire replacements on the majority of streets across the district and "Out of Scope" works around 8,200 which are the more challenging assets such as heritage assets, pole mounted and wall mounted luminaires, columns in back streets, overhead cabled columns etc.
- The "In Scope" works is being undertaken by the external contractor Amey OW Ltd. and the "Out of Scope" works will be a mix of the Councils in house delivery teams for the luminaire replacements and a further contract resource for the remaining column replacements and connections.

#### 3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

None currently.

#### 4. FINANCIAL & RESOURCE APPRAISAL

- There are no financial issues arising from the project to date. The funding was agreed by the PAG and is split as follows; £25,893,509 Prudential Borrowing £19,084,597 SALIX interest free Government Funding for carbon reduction projects.
- Upon completion of the project, it is projected that the Council will have reduced the annual energy consumption, as outlined in the table in Appendix A.

#### 5. RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES

- Due to the size and nature of the project there are several risks in delivering the works, these are being effectively managed through the NEC contract with Amey OW Ltd. as well as the whole project being overseen by a governance framework and monthly project board meetings to ensure that risks are managed and mitigated effectively.
- The Smart Street Lighting Project Board reviews the risk register at each meeting and assesses whether escalation is required or whether the Project Executive is satisfied that the risks are being managed effectively.

#### 6. LEGAL APPRAISAL

#### 7. Links to the Locality Plan

Smart Street Lighting is an all-District service delivery project.

#### 7.1 SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

- The Smart Street Lighting project forms part of the Council Plan in helping to deliver the priority area "A Sustainable District". By replacing the old street lighting units with energy efficient LED's this will reduce the Councils energy consumption for street lighting by at least 65% whilst providing lower maintenance requirements and costs.
- The installation of the Central Management System facilitates the dynamic control of the lighting enabling dimming and switching off lights, automatic fault reporting which saves on physical night inspections of lights to identify failures as well as pseudo energy metering so that the actual consumption of the units can be monitored and provided for billing purposes.
- The specification for all new lighting columns has been developed to provide a useful life of 50 years rather than 30 years offered with standard specification columns, reducing the necessity to replace as frequently. Also, the LED luminaires are projected to have a 20-year life, again reducing the need for frequent replacement as opposed to the old lamps which had a 4 6-year life.

#### 7.2 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS IMPACTS

By reducing the energy consumption of the street lighting assets this provides a significant reduction in CO<sup>2</sup> emissions. It is anticipated that the savings will be around 6000 tonnes of CO<sup>2</sup> per annum when the project is complete. In addition to this by specifying materials with longer life this also reduces the Councils carbon footprint.

The provision of the CMS and the LoRaWAN network enables the Council to control the lighting and provide connectivity of a plethora of sensors which could assist in providing data to support the Councils response to the Climate Emergency. Refer to Appendix A for carbon reduction figures.

#### 7.3 COMMUNITY SAFETY IMPLICATIONS

- The first phase of the project was to survey every asset in the District to ascertain both electrical and structural safety, this included non-destructive testing of all steel lighting columns. During the survey, columns were identified for replacement based on the results of the testing with many concrete columns proposed for replacement. Overall, the column replacements identified are in the region of 30% of the stock.
- Inevitably, during the survey around 700 columns were found to be structurally unsafe requiring immediate action. These units were cut down to just above the shoulder around 1.2m above ground level and made safe. Risk assessments were undertaken to identify those requiring urgent replacement based upon whether they were the only light in the street or multiple lights in the same street. The vast majority of these have been replaced with around 15 outstanding across the District.
- The provision of a safe, modernised, fit for purpose streetlighting infrastructure is an important service for ongoing community safety.

#### 7.4 HUMAN RIGHTS ACT

#### 7.6 WARD IMPLICATIONS

- As an all-District project, all wards in the Keighley Constituency are affected by the project. This includes installation works resulting in traffic management measures, barriers on pavements and limited time disruptions in all streets as work is carried out.




Chart 2 – This shows the consumption of energy in Kilowatt Hours for a 12 month period as a comparison between the old lighting and new lighting.








Chart 4 – Shows the estimated before and after  $CO^2$  emissions in tonnes per annum as a result of the SSL project

Stronger Comms colleagues working on the app; Colleagues supported by WO/AWO to identify businesses in the ward as locations to redeem coins; event at Keighley Library for vol orgs to learn more and sign up to Citizen Coin.

**Youth Service** - 10 young people, including several from Bracken Bank, attended a session at Bradford College where they experienced taster sessions in various skills and trades and the YP were very

Staff from various organisations supported the day including Yorkshire Housing, Manningham Housing, KACO, Youth Service, WYP and Roshni Ghar. Information was provided to support tenants, such as re. damp and mould, as well as opportunities for them to speak to housing officers and staff, and have fun!

Braithwaite Community Engagement – Led by AWO, Housing officers from Incommunities and Places For People, joined with partners including Ward Cllrs and WYP, in a series of community engagement sessions, giving tenants opportunities to report things to their housing providers and Council officers.

Centre Point and Men's Shed – Linked by WO, Centre Point (charity for homeless young people or those at risk of homelessness) worked with Lion's Den Men's Shed to build a vehicle for the Soap Box Derby, also building skills and networks.

Incommunities customer engagement – Incommunities now have a dedicated officer to develop engagement with tenants/customers on policy changes and other matters to make sure they have a voice.

Carlton Gardens CBMDC Scheme – CBMDC Officer, Incommunities and local NPT officers have been working together and with residents at the scheme around various issues such as safety of children playing, litter, ASB vehicles and preparing for Winter.

**Sue Belcher – Play Forum** – Play Bradford have worked with Sue Belcher Centre, One In A Million and other partners to locate a container in Bracken Bank that contains play equipment and resources which, through partnership working, will be available as a community resource to encourage play 'on the doorstep'.

Youth Service – Bradford Youth Service in Keighley continue to support young people across the ward through open access and closed sessions, including sessions at Oakbank school's sports facilities, Rainbow Centre in Braithwaite, 1:1 Buddy Work and within secondary schools. Young People from Kly West recently addressed ClIrs and other guests at an Area Committee meeting giving examples of the work of the youth service and how much the young people value it.

Story Pole Project- Preliminary planning work has taken place and a grant won to develop a project with local artists, young people and partners, exploring safety of public spaces and story-telling. The voices of young people will be at the forefront of this project and will include young people from the ward, working with their peers.

Age UK Bracken Bank – WO, AWO, Neighbourhood Warden and partners worked with Sheila from Age UK on community engagement in Bracken Bank. We spoke to people in the area who might like to meet new people and approx. 12 residents have now been meeting together and co-designing craft and activity sessions. Through this, people can improve their health and well-being through socialising, having meaningful connections, and taking part in activities together.

Braithwaite Engagement – As previously mentioned, a series of engagement sessions have continued in the Braithwaite area. Through this, residents in Bankfield area have identified an interest in gardening and growing . Work continues to develop this with these residents and Incommunities, with a view to exploring work with partners such as Keighley Parish, Keighley Town Council allotments officer, and developing the work CNET began when they provided some raised beds to some families in Braithwaite.

**Youth Service** - Young people are engaged in open access cook and eat sessions, physical activities, trips and also 1:1 buddy work as a result of Youth in Mind referrals for young people requiring support with mental and emotional well-being. These all empower young people around their health choices.

Sue Belcher Centre with Modality Partnership – Volunteers at Sue Belcher centre continue to facilitate work with Modality and other health providers to bring health services to residents in their community. These include, Locala sexual health service, vaccination hubs, Women's Health info sessions (menopause and breast health).

Keighley Parish Good Food Shop – Spokes of the Town Centre Good Food Shop have been delivered in the ward at Rainbow Centre, Merlin Top School and pop-up at Phoenix School Summer Fair. It is a 'social supermarket to help tackle food poverty, reduce stigma and increase independence.

#### **Progress**

The New Keith Thompson Centre – Volunteers continue to develop plans for a new community building in Braithwaite as well as organising litter picks, a Coronation celebration and fundraising, with support as necessary from AWO and WO.

Braithwaite engagement and ABCD – Strengths based engagement is ongoing across the ward and there have been several multi-agency sessions organised around Braithwaite to discover skills and interests among residents and start making connections between them to promote a sense of local pride. These sessions have also provided opportunities for NPT staff to engage with residents, gather information and offer advice.

**Braithwaite Village residents' meeting** – WO and NPT staff met with residents to discuss various matters, provide updates and coordinate a problem solving approach.

**Highways** – Ward Cllrs, WO and AWO met with senior highways colleagues to discuss road safety suggestions and solutions across the ward. Work continues in liaison with Road Safety team for AWO and Neighbourhood Warden to deliver work in primary schools across the ward.

**Domestic and Sexual Violence work** – WO, AWO and youth service working with DASV team to develop various strands of work including work with young people via youth work, training for front line staff, and info sharing between schools and police.

**Community stars** – Nominations have been made for groups and individuals in the ward to recognise the contributions people make to their communinties.

VCS Organisations – AWO and WO continue to work with and support VCS orgs across the ward such as Sue Belcher centre, Men's Shed, TNKTC, TGSC, Keighley Parish Laycock Village Hall.

**King's Coronation Celebrations** – Groups across the ward were granted funding to celebrate the King's Coronation, including Laycock, Braithwaite, Exley Head, bringing communities and neighbours together to celebrate locally.

#### **Progress**

Merlin Top Environmental Ambassadors – AWO and Neighbourhood Warden have linked in with Merlin Top Primary School's Environmental Ambassadors, a group of year 6 pupils. They have involved the CBMDC Recycling Advisor team and are developing other work, which the pupils are central to planning to take action on environmental initiatives.

TNKTC Litter pick — Volunteers, ClIrs and KACO staff took part in a community litter pick around Braithwaite. Organised by The New Keith Thompson Centre, volunteers from the group were joined by families from the area. The group plans to do more of these activities and involve community in the tidy-ups.

**Ward Gully Week** – CBMDC gully team were supported by KACO staff and wardens during a week of action to clean street gullies across the ward.

Bradford Works/Probation – we have worked with Probation Service and Shipley College's Bradford Works to continue to smarten up grot-spots in the Ward through cutting back overgrowth, tidying up verges and helping at local community centre.

Fly tipping successes – Env Enforcement team have successful prosecutions for people dumping rubbish at two locations in the ward. Cameras are being used to collect evidence. Working in partnership with social landlords, to tackle longstanding problem areas.

**Unadopted Back Streets** – AWO and Neighbourhood warden have again used the 'unadopted back streets' policy to good effect by engaging with residents and supporting them to make improvements to their community at Grant St.

**Community Garden** – The Good Shepherd Centre are working with Craven College students on their community garden.

**Braithwaite Bin Pilot** – AWO coordinated an action day around contaminated bins in an area of Braithwaite Estate involving partners and residents through engagement.

#### **Craven Ward Good News Stories**





(Better Skills, More Good Jobs and Growing Economy)
The Ward Leadership Team Meeting Craven Ward is
investigating how to support the local economy and jobs for
people of all ages from the wider community. A meeting
has been held and in-depth discussion undertaken with
representatives from Citizen Coin, Skills House, Invest in
Bradford and Incommunities.

Decent Homes Persimmon Homes are submitting a planning application to build approximately 150 houses off Bolton Road in Silsden. Local residents are being invited to share their views on the proposal, which would bring 2, 3, 4 and 5 bedroom properties to land on the north east of the town, adjacent to Bolton Road and Brown Bank Lane and 20% of the new homes will be affordable and available for discounted rent or purchase, and it is also proposing an area of 'public space' as part of the development.





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(Good Start, Great School) The Youth Offer Partnership strives to give young people a voice and support young people in their day to day lives and activities. Youth Workers link in with South Craven School and meetings take place at Silsden Town Hall. One of the key aims is to support young people's health and well-being across the local community.

(Better Health, Better Lives) The Wharfedale and Silsden Health Partnership operates in Silsden, Ilkley, Addingham, and Burley-In Wharfedale (part of Shipley area). The Partnership promotes the Health and Well-being agenda. Each Partnership has 2 anchor organisations who enhance local promotion and connectivity.







(Safe Strong and Active Communities) Addingham Environmental Group in partnership with the Civic Society have organised the Jumble Trail to take place on Sunday 24 September in various locations in Addingham Village. The jumble trail will consist of around 40 stalls around the village; and all welcome to come and do some Sunday Shopping and support charities through purchases on the day. Some of the stalls will be outside people's homes as well as located at four hubs including Plan-it-Earth, The Library, the Scout Pavilion, and North Street.

(A Sustainable District) The Neighbourhood Warden's have been working alongside members of the public from Craven Ward to take a lead in keeping pavements and hedgerows clean and tidy from over growing vegetation and have supported residents to engage in cutting back works to allow full access to public footpaths and highway localities making a real difference and restoring footpaths back to their full capacity for all pedestrians.

#### **Ilkley Ward Good News Stories**











Better Skills, More Good Jobs and Growing Economy Ilkley Chat every Tuesday morning advertises a range of local jobs under three main sections of: - Main Jobs, Apprenticeships and Volunteers putting all information in one place. Many local businesses regularly use this service and comment on the good applicants received, compared to both expensive paid for adverts and those placed through Job Centres. Support for local businesses can be found at – Invest In Bradford and Ilkley Bid.

(Decent Homes) Incommunities and Council Wardens have been working alongside Incommunities Householders and private owners to address dog fouling issues in and around the Valley Road and Valley Drive areas of Ilkley. A leaflet drop was undertaken, and dog fouling sings placed at various location in and around the locality, Ben Rhydding. Since the mail drop and the placement of signage complaints from all residents has been addressed.









Good Start, Great School The Youth Offer Partnership strives to give young people a voice and support young people in their day to day lives and activities. Youth Workers link in with Ilkley Grammar School, Local Community Groups involving young people in community life and supporting young people's health and well-being. The young people have been organising surveys, gathering information and data in line with local service and provision.

Better Health, Better Lives) The Clarke Foley centre in partnership with Dementia Friendly Ilkley Action (DFIA) joined forces and offer support over tea and coffee to those living with memory problems, their carers. This service provides a safe space to voice problems and concerns and share advice and experiences. The meetings often include live entertainment with a dance, music or a sing along. The support sessions are open to anyone living with memory loss.









(Safe Strong and Active Communities) In July 23 the Ilkley Pride Event was a great success and the committee have reconvened their meetings after the summer break to start planning Ilkley Pride 2024. Support for the group has grown rapidly in the town and the event is now a firm fixture in the annual calendar. The group has been successful in working with council Youth Service, Keighley who have set up and are running a well-attended group for LGBTQIA+youth. Plans, for the forthcoming year include a launch event in January and the main event, which will fall in Pride month itself next year.

(A Sustainable District) – Ilkley Park 'Hot Weather Plan' operates during the six-week holiday period especially in the hot weather when lots of visitors arrive to make use of the park and amenities. Partners work together to adopt a coordinate approach. The Police, PSPO, and Neighbourhood Wardens undertake patrols and lend support to visitors, Friends of Ilkley Park Group along with Cleansing and Parks Services assist with litter picking and clearing and Highways Wardens assist with parking issues. Together this is a combined effort to promote safe and enjoyable outdoor environmental spaces.

Haworth Central Park Bowls Club The Club were awarded a small community chest grant to make their facilities more accessible. The improvements to the facilities mean older and disabled members and players are catered for. This is as well as the club offering sessions for young people via a local mental health group and the health benefits to all players through gentle exercise, socialising and being outdoors. Volunteers running the club have taken it from few players to over 100, and they go from strength to strength with wins in matches and lots of

social events and taster sessions.

Attendees came from across the district attended and were able to come together to celebrate who they are. It was an incrediby inclusive day filled run by the great young people.



#### **Decent Homes**

Partnership work with the DVLA and Police enabled days of action to take place in Central Ward to tackle untaxed and tested vehicles to be enforced against. 24 vehicles were removed to a compound in Leeds. Alongside the cars removed, evidence gathered has led to a new action plan being put in place for businesses storing cars on the public highway.



Better Health, Better Lives



Working with the community health partnership the ward officer was able to develop and fund a community health champions project. This has involved messages being professional filmed in community languages and delivered by respected community members. It is hoped that such messaging will have greater engagement and reach and help dispel misinformation.

Asset based community development work is currently being undertaken in Lawkholme Neighbourhood. Here the assistant ward officer is collaborating with residents around planter ownership by individual streets. Strong progress is being made with groups coming together to improve cleanliness in a sustainable resident led way.



Following this the Ward Officer has linked in to organise a joint litter pick, with students from Keighley college supported by our wardens, to take place on 30th October.

#### (Decent Homes)

Liaising with colleagues and housing officers how we can best share advice and support Landlords. Private Sector lettings scheme link (<u>Private Sector Lettings Scheme</u>) promoted and shared across networks.



Currently Supporting collegues in developing a Waste Managing booklet Guide to be provided to landlords for their tenants along with the Waste Management Agreement, also to be provided as part of the booklet.

This guide has been designed to provide the necessary information to landlords and tenants on their responsibilities with recommendations to ensure they manage their waste effectively.

#### (Good Start Great Schools)

Co-ordinated a safety awareness week led by Riddlesden St Mary's school in partnership with District Councillors, Police, Bradford Council staff (Ward Officer and Asst. Ward Officer, Neighbour Warden, Parking Services) and it's Road safety team.



The Main safety focuses for Super Safe Day were Road/car safety, E-safety, Canal/water safety and What to do in an emergency.

A wide range of activities were staged with some linking back into the curriculum. These included:

PSCO On a blustery cold morning, armed with a speed gun to check vehicles speed. Even passing Police cars got checked. A significant number of cars were given the "thumbs down" by the children as they were overspeeding.


Year 5 will have made a 'parking promise' that will be put in the schools' MM/leaflet for parents to sign.

### (Better Health, Better Lives)

Keighley East District Councillors identified lack of local activities in the Sto ckbridge Area of the Ward and provided some funds to Roshni Ghar to carry out a consultation and develop some activities. WO and AWO liaised with Roshni Ghar to develop a questionaire and supported them with the door step consultations. Sally the local warden also came out to help with the consultation. Over 100 residents



were consulted. The main concen identified was around wellbeing (Pysical & mental). Lack of community space in Stockbridge was identified as a barrier to people accessing services and a Local primary school was identified as a potential venue for activities.

The AWO worked with Roshni Ghar and Riddlesden St Mary's Primary to develop sessions at the school. Due to safeguarding the school agreed for Roshni Ghar to deliver some wellbeing session initially for parents of the children at the school, starting in September 23.

AWO is currently in discussion with the

school to explore how the facility could be opened up to the local community rather than just parents of children at the school.

Parents and children attending the Good Shepherd Centre and students from Our Lady of Victories Catholic Primary School (OLV) in Keighley West benefited from an interactive and exciting reading journey on board the Literacy Trust's "big yellow bus" (the Bradford Stories Bus). There was a buzz of excitement as the Literacy Trust staff read stories to the participants and as children

and students explored all the nooks and crannies the bus offered. At the end of each session the children and students took away a

free age-appropriate book as a gift to further their excitement of and interest in reading. This was the first visit of the bus with future events and connectivity planned. The Literacy Trust will link into the Keighley Schools Together partnership and there will be further work developed with the Good Shepherd Centre and across other areas.



#### **Better Health, Better Lives**

#### Age UK Friendship Group in Bracken Bank

In partnership with Age UK, staff from Bradford Council's Neighbourhoods and Community Services team, Incommunities and West Yorkshire police visited residents in Bracken Bank during July



to speak to people about how they like living in the area, how well connected they are with their neighbours and whether they'd like to be part of developing a friendship group for older people in the area who might be feeling or at risk of loneliness and isolation. This is part of ongoing research that Age UK are compiling around loneliness



in people aged 50+ in the Bracken Bank area after previous research suggested that Bracken Bank is a hotspot for loneliness. Since the initial engagement, approx. 12 residents have now been meeting together and co-designing craft and activity sessions. Through this, people can improve their health and well-being through socialising, having meaningful connections, and taking art in activities together.

AWO and Neighbourhood Warden have linked in with Merlin Top Primary School's Environmental Ambassadors, a group of year 6 pupils. They have involved the CBMDC Recycling Advisor team and are developing other work, which the pupils are central to planning to take

action on

environmental initiatives. Students had a varierty of ideas including: -design posters around driving to school and the impact of leaving car engines running while waiting; improve recycling by putting coloured boxes in classrooms to match different items which can recycled; - planting and growing things - possibly a gardening club; - posters designed by students

#### 1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report presents the recommendations from the Grants Advisory Group for the Keighley Area in respect of the allocation of funding that has been amalgamated from funding received by Bradford Council from the United Kingdom Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF), the West Yorkshire Mayor's Cost of Living fund (CoLF) and the Household Support Fund (HSF).

#### 2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The City of Bradford Metropolitan District Council (CBMDC) via its Constituency Area Co-ordinators' Offices has invited applications from eligible local organisations to apply for funding available from The West Yorkshire Mayor's Cost of Living Fund (WYCA CoLF) £287,000, Household Support Fund (HSF) £172,000 and United Kingdom Share Prosperity Fund, UKSPF £135,000. These are actual sums for community grants once £120,000 has been transferred from the Cost of Living Fund to Bradford Credit Union for affordable loans and support for school uniforms.
- 2.2 The UKSPF Programme replaces the European Structural and Investment Fund following Brexit. The UK government released the UKSPF prospectus in April 2022 as part of its central mission to level up the whole of the United Kingdom. The allocation for West Yorkshire is £80,486,557 over a 3-year period, with £7,578 million allocated for the Bradford District. It is a three-pillar framework for allocating this funding:
  - Pillar 1 Communities and Place
  - Pillar 2 Supporting Local Business
  - Pillar 3 People and Skills
- 2.3 Applications from eligible local organisations across the Keighley constituency were invited to apply from the total funding of £97,128. The funds from CoLF, HSF and UKPSF were combined to provide emergency local services and support during the cost-of-living crisis, specifically for food banks/parcels, warm places debt advice and support for mental health.

Examples of support can be (not an exhaustive list):

- Food (or other such as hygiene, clothes) parcels
- Establishing new or extending existing warm places
- Support and advice
- Measures to improve energy efficiency for households
- Tangible items for vulnerable groups (slow cookers, hot water bottles, flasks, blankets)
- 2.4 All grants will be distributed via the Area Co-ordinator's Offices who cover the 5 Parliamentary Constituencies in the district, which are Bradford South, Bradford East, Bradford West, Shipley and Keighley.
- 2.5 The Stronger Communities Team developed a single application process and criteria required for the combined funding and these funds will be administered through this team. The funding went live in September 2023 with a closing date for receipt of applications of 30 September 2023. The grant must be spent by 31st March 2024

- and monitoring forms to be returned by end of June 2024.
- 2.6 The West Yorkshire Lord Mayor's Cost of Living Fund, Household Support Fund and UKSPF when combined, total £594,000 in grants. Each area was offered a baseline budget of £50,000 and the remaining balance of £344,000 was shared by applying the deprivation index formula.
- 2.7 Decisions on the allocation of this funding have been delegated to Area Committees to distribute to the Voluntary and Community Sector. The Grants Advisory Group (GAG) is made up of elected members nominated by the Area Committee at the beginning of each municipal year to help support the decision-making process in conjunction with the Area Co-ordinator. Once all grant applications are appraised and before moving to contracting, the Area Co-ordinator will present the recommendations of the GAG to the full Area Committee to enable agreement to proceed contracting. No funding will be released to organisations that received funding in the first round of UKSPF grant allocations until all the required monitoring information has been returned.
- 2.8 Monitoring and evaluation will be undertaken, and the information collected will include:
  - a. nature of the support received (e.g. warm space/food parcel etc)
  - b. financial value of the support (estimated where appropriate)
  - c. other key beneficiary information as far as possible, including ward, gender, ethnicity, and disability.
- 2.9 Data will be collected (including case studies) to enable the timely evaluation of Fund impacts to be undertaken by the Combined Authority, such as:
  - a. improved health and wellbeing,
  - b. increased aspirations/motivation/participation,
  - c. reduced barriers to inclusion and employability,
- 2.10 The table below sets out key dates for the allocation of this funding:

#### Call for funding applications:

Measures to Reduce the Impacts from the Cost of Living Crisis for Households in the Bradford District

#### **Summary**

The City of Bradford Metropolitan District Council (CBMDC) via its Constituency Area Offices is inviting applications from eligible local organisations to apply for the combines funding of UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF), Householder support fund (HSF) West Yorkshire Mayor's Cost of living Fund (WYCA C of LF) to deliver support to households and individuals to reduce the cost of living.

Households have suffered over the past months from the increase in costs including energy and food. There is now further funding available to support organisations in the Bradford district to deliver help to those households that need it the most. It is similarly recognised that organisations are also under strain due to financial pressures at the same time as there is a significant increase in demand for services based within local places.

Due to the urgency of the support needed, organisations applying to deliver this support are required to read the funding call timetable below carefully, and only apply if they are confident the organisation can meet the timescales in addition to the other funding criteria set out.

#### **Programme details**

Each Bradford Constituency Area Office (Bradford East, Bradford South, Bradford West, Keighley and Shipley) has been allocated a proportion of the combined funding that is aimed at reducing the cost of living. Organisations can propose to deliver support in one or more area. We expect each area's allocation to be divided across multiple organisations.

The support needs to meet one or more of the following outputs:

- 1. Number of households receiving support;
- 2. Number of households supported to take energy efficient measures;
- 3. Number of people reached.

In addition, applicants are expected to provide an increase to the following baseline numbers (if relevant to the activity proposed):

- 1. Improved engagement numbers;
- 2. Increased uptake of energy efficient measures.

The minimum grant value an organisation can apply for in each area is £2,000 and the maximum grant value is up to £10,000. The grant must be spent by the programme end date of 31<sup>st</sup> March 2024. Applicants can include up to 10% of the value of the grant as Management & Administrative costs for delivering the support. This must be set out clearly in the application form. Examples of support can be (not exhaustive list):

- Food (or other such as hygiene, clothes) parcels
- Establishing new or extending existing warm places
- Support and advice
- Measures to improve energy efficiency for households
- Tangible items for vulnerable groups (slow cookers, hot water bottles, flasks, blankets)

Each organisation must in the application form set out clearly what the funding will be spent on, how they intend to distribute the support / undertake activity. The funding can be used to support an existing activity, please set that out clearly in the application form.

Organisations wanting to deliver support in more than one area/constituency/locality must submit a separate application form to each relevant Area Office and make it clear in each application that they have done this and which constituencies/wards they have applied for.

Note: the funding is <u>revenue only</u>, as such cannot be used towards capital expenditure such as refurbishments or building upgrades.

#### **Scoring priorities**

The following priorities will be considered when assessing and scoring the bids:

- a) Locally based organisations
- b) Activity linked to priorities contained within the Locality Plan(s) and / or Ward Plan(s) for the relevant constituency
- c) Value for money (number of outputs delivered for funding required)
- d) Evidence for successful delivery of previous/current grant programmes (if applicable)
- e) Ability to deliver within the timescales given.
