1. SUMMARY

The application is for the variation of a Club Premises Certificate to extend permitted hours for live and recorded music and the supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club on a Friday and Saturday.

Crossflatts Cricket Club, Keighley Road, Bingley.

The premises currently hold a Club Premises Certificate with the following permitted hours;

2.6 Relevant Representations Received

Individual, Body or Business

A letter of representation has been received from a local resident which raises concerns of an increase of noise, disturbance and anti social behaviour by patrons leaving the club later at night due to extended hours. The resident also has concerns about litter and bottles being smashed on the resident's driveway.

3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Legal Appraisal

3.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires the Council to carry out its various licensing functions so as to promote the following four licensing objectives:

- a) the prevention of crime and disorder
- b) public safety
- c) the prevention of public nuisance
- d) the protection of children from harm



- 3.2** The Council must also have regard to the guidance issued by the Home Office under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regard must also be taken of the Council's statement of Licensing Policy for the District.
- 3.3** Where it is decided it is necessary to depart from the statutory guidance or the Licensing Policy on the merits of a particular case; then special reasons justifying this must be given that can be sustained.
- 3.4** Only "relevant representations" can be taken into account. In order to be "relevant" a representation must fairly relate to achieving a licensing objective. If it does not, it must be discounted.
- 3.5** Any licensing conditions that Members may propose attaching must also relate to achieving one of the licensing objectives; be tailored to the actual premises and style of licensable activity; must be reasonably achievable by the applicant and in his/her control.

Statement of Policy Issues

- 3.6** The following parts of the Licensing Policy are of particular importance; Part 4 (prevention of crime and disorder) and Part 6 (prevention of public nuisance).
- 3.7** The Annexes to the Policy sets out various types of model condition that could be considered.

4. OPTIONS

4.1 Members may:

- (a) Vary a club premises certificate as applied for subject to any mandatory conditions and the precautions specified in the operating schedule submitted.
 - (b) Vary a club premises certificate in whole or in part subject to such additional conditions relating to achievement of the licensing objectives as members think fit; or
 - (c) Refuse to vary the club premises certificate.
- 4.2** Should the applicant or any other party to the hearing feel aggrieved at any decision with regard to the licence or to any conditions or restrictions attached by Members they may appeal to the Magistrates Court.

with the general interest. The Council's powers set out in the recommendations fall within the states right. A fair balance must be struck between public safety and the applicant's rights.

Article 6 – A procedural right to a fair hearing. As refusal of the application is an option, adherence to the Panels' usual procedure of affording a hearing to the applicant is very important. The applicant should also be able to examine the requirements of the fire authority. If the decision is to refuse then reasons should be given.
