Funding for the above services will cease in March 2018.

Funding for services at Thorpe Edge will continue until June 2018-these include EAE Walking Group, Wildlife and plant id walk, dog walking, 10+ challenge, swimming at Eccleshill pool, Tai chi, Boxercise, football training, fun with food (families and children) and primary school cooking classes

3.4 On 1st October 2017 a new fully integrated substance misuse service for Alcohol and Drug users in Bradford and Airedale commenced under the service name `New Directions` .

The service is delivered by Change, Grow, Live , a large national recovery focussed organisation who are working in partnership with Bridge and Project 6.

The service operates a dedicated single point of contact based at Pelican House, 10 Currer Street, Bradford BD1 5BA and all service users, carers , professionals or members of the public can make referrals to the service through a dedicated 24/7 contact number of 01274 296023.

Any individual who accesses interventions at the service will be allocated a dedicated recovery worker who will work with the individual at an appropriate location. New Directions has hubs located in both Bradford and Keighley and also access to 27 community locations across the district.

3.5 There is 1 outreach venue in Idle & Thackley at a GP surgery. This is currently being reviewed as not many people are accessing this location. The GP surgery is making referrals for patients but they are often choosing to access advice in other venues eg Gateway, Thorpe Edge or Eccleshill Mechanics Institute. This may be due to the surgery not being on a bus route. It is likely that the sessions at the surgery will be ended and an alternative location sought within the ward.

Family Action have indicated they are continuing to review venues in this locality and are waiting to meet with Cllr Rachel Sunderland to discuss this.

The performance data for Q2 shows 15 people from Idle & Thackley accessed services in the Bradford East locality and 21 people from Idle & Thackley accessed services outside of the locality. 6 in Windhill, , 5 Bradford CAB, 3 Shipley CAB, 2 Wrose Health Centre, and the remainder in 6 different locations. These figures do not include those accessing phone advice or other contacts.

There are 5127 privately own houses, 951 privately rented and 860 social rented properties in Idle and Thackley ward. The ward is identified through the Development Plan as a site for a large number of houses.

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May to August 2017 – Youth Worker, National Citizen Service, volunteers from Springfield Centre and Ward Officer regularly met to plan and organise 7 days of activities for young people during school holidays. Activities included drama workshops, environmental clean ups around Springfield Centre and art workshops. The aim was to develop the skills of young people aged 15 – 17 by giving them personal challenges, team challenges and real challenges to building social action.

There are 915 children living in Idle and Thackley ward aged between 12 and 18, 48% are female and 52% are male. 90% of these young people are white British. Less than half of them (545) attend Immanuel College the remainder are split between 52 other places of education. 19 young people (as of 31.10.2016) are on the role of a Pupil Referral Unit. There are 3 homes for Children in Public Care and 15 children placed in foster care and 15 children from Idle and Thackley placed in foster care elsewhere. There are 16 children subject of a Child Protection Plan and 18 children subject to Child in Need plan. There are 18 young people with a statement of SEN and 31 with an Education, Health and Care Plan. 31 Families are working with the Families First Plan and there are 12 children at risk from child sexual exploitation.

Parkland and Greenwood Primary schools and Hanson Academy are judged by OFSTED to be requiring improvement. The remainder are either good or outstanding.
