I have never objected to anything before but feel that the granting of a license to sell alcohol from 7am to 11pm (and later on bank holidays) to Pave 98b Main St Haworth would be extremely detrimental for Haworth and its residents. And why would a small coffee shop / bistro need such a licence to sell on and off the premises for such hours? Could this just be a facade to change the business type in the future if a licence is obtained? My full points are below but this area is already more than adequately served by licensed premises that in general very well managed but some disorder does happen and adding another avenue to purchase alcohol that can be then drunk on the street can only add to this.

- The prevention of crime and disorder

Granting of this licence will only add to the availability of alcohol in this area which is already well served and allowing out sales will encourage more drinking after hours on the street causing disorder in the village.

- Public safety

A coffee shop / bistro would not be a good environment to sell alcohol as the staff would not have the experience to deal with drunk clientele. Even the village pubs recognise this and on event days and public holidays employ door staff for the safety of the public. Will this premises be told to do the same at such times

- Prevention of public nuisance

Allowing out sales will encourage street drinking after closing time when there are no public toilets and encourage more litter and noise in a very small area.

- Protection of children from harm

If this premises are allowed to serve alcohol until 11pm will the premises be limited to people aged 18 yrs and over if not what will be put in place to ensure children are not allowed on the premises at later times. The village on an evening is predominantly an adult area and if a premises that sells alcohol until 11pm is also allowing children in until that time then I am afraid that the council has no regard at all for the children's well being.

In general the location for this business is wrong as the area is adequately served. The premises is too small for the kind of business suggested and what will be put in place if the business decided to change its ethos or type if a licence is granted? I believe if you should not allow a licence to be issued. If you do then it should be in sales only (no off premises sales). It should also be limited to 8pm and alcohol should only be served with food (that would fit the ethos of the business as described and ensure it doesn't change overnight into something different). It's about time common sense prevailed in Haworth and what it does not need is another bar!
